 TORONTO (CP) — Queen Mother Elizabeth were the colors of her host at the races Saturday and watched jockeys wearing the turquoise silks of horseman E. P. There was the Mad Parliament, the Good Parliament, the Parliament of the Bats, the Merciless, and the Added Parliament. The last got its name because it never could make up its mind to do anything. There was also the Baraborens Parliament, so named because of one of its members, Prase-God Baraborens, a Puritan. In much more recent times—historically speaking, in the long record of British parliamentary affairs—there was the time when seats in Parliament were sold to the highest bidder. Men of wealth and position gave seats to their friends for favors received and for what the friends might get out of them. PRICES WERE HIGH From the prices some of them paid, the beneficiaries must have run high. The Reform Act of 1832 put an end to this. Remember, too, the days, not so many years ago, when women voted on the ramparts for the right to vote? Today the foremost coffee party at which the ladies of the neighborhood gather is an implicit engagement for the campaigning politician. Well Known Nurse Dies

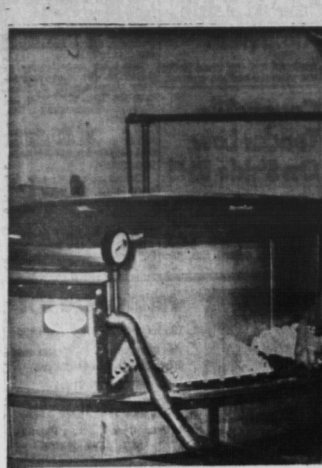

Liberal and Social Credit are running in all 78 constituencies and NDP candidates in 40. Last election the province returned 20 Conservatives and 20 Liberals, giving the Conservatives a majority for the first time in 1958. Seventy seats are at stake in the four Western provinces where in 1958 the Conservatives swept all 14 seats in Manitoba, all 17 in Alberta and all but one of Saskatchewan's 22 constituencies. The CCF, the forerunner of the NDP, took the other Saskatchewan seats and four of British Columbia's 22—the other 18 went Conservative. The only Liberal elected west of Ontario last time was in the Northwest Territories, while a Conservative won the Yukon. On the other side of the country, Conservatives made clean sweeps of Nova Scotia's 12 seats and Prince Edward Island's four. New Brunswick's 12 seats divided seven to the Conservatives and three to the Liberals. Newfoundland gave the Liberals their only provincial majority—five seats to two for the Conservatives.
