Very much worth the money paid for it, too, is the heavy Swedish smoked glass which grows more and more popular in the home of its fortunate owner.

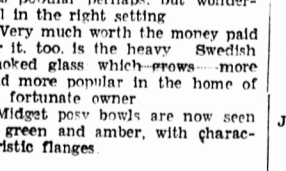
Midget pony bowls are now seen in green and amber, with characteristic flanges.
