

Local and Other Items.

TRACED TO BOSTON.—Edwin B. Hall, the murderer of McKimble, of Pictou, N. S., has been traced to Boston.

THE CIRCUS.—Two circuses—Howe's and Forepaugh's—will probably visit the Maritime Provinces this year.

MILITARY.—No. 1 Battery, Garrison Artillery will meet for drill this evening at eight A full attendance is requested.

CORRECTION.—The three men under arrest for burglarizing the store of Mr. D. McKay, will be up for trial to-morrow (Friday) morning.

THE TIGRISH TEA.—The tea party train from Tigrish arrived in the city at eleven o'clock last night. Those who attended say they passed a very pleasant day.

MUSICAL.—We are just now being attacked by street musicians, having no less than a piano on wheels, a hurdy-gurdy man and a harper and violinist "doing" the city at present.

LECTURE.—Mr. Creighton, of Quebec, lectured in Souris last evening. His subject was "Palestine." The lecture was in aid of the fund for the maintenance of street lamps, and quite a snug sum was realized.

RELEASED.—The case of Captain John Hughes, confined in jail for violating the Scotch Act, having been favorably considered by the Minister of Justice, the Captain was released from custody last evening.

NARROW ESCAPE.—A woman narrowly escaped being killed a day or two ago at the Intercolonial railway station at Levis, by a G. T. R. train which came in at a high rate of speed. She was standing at the edge of the platform, but the force with which the train came in caused her dress to be caught by a car, and she was dragged under it. Fortunately the train had come to a stop before she was reached by the wheels, and her only injury was a slight wound on the head caused by her fall.—Moncton Times.

PUGILISTIC.—An international glove contest of fifteen rounds, Marquis of Queensbury rules, is to come off within two weeks in Boston between Jim Kendrick, middle weight champion of Great Britain, and Jack C. McGee, of East Boston. Both men are restricted to 145 pounds each. McGee is getting in fine condition, and that the contest will be a hot one. McGee, it will be remembered, was one of the three sparrers who gave the exhibitions in Scott's Hall a few weeks ago.

A SCANDAL.—The church-going people of Souris West were horrified, last Sunday morning, to find one of their most zealous members in the act of cutting and raking the timothy which grows in the beautiful little cemetery at that place. We are of the opinion that a more suitable time than the Sabbath morn should be chosen for such labors; and also trust that, in future, this pseudo-Christian will desist from scandalizing the living and desecrating the dead, to gratify the corporeal inclinations of a consumptive horse.—Com.

CENSURABLE CONDUCT.—Advice from Cape Tormentine state that certain parties have taken lately to defacing and destroying property at that place. Not content with defacing buildings by tarring them, expensive shop windows are broken between twelve and one o'clock at night. Particular spite seems to be directed against Mr. J. B. Belyea, one of the most respected residents of the place, who, though not a native of the village, belongs to the province, and is a law-abiding British subject. There is a strong suspicion as to who the guilty parties are, and they will probably figure before the Court in a few days.

News From Wimbledon.

TORONTO, July 18. The Mail's cable from London says the corporation prize for Indian and Colonial volunteers was competed for by Canada alone in the grand aggregate competition with the following result:—Staff-Sergt. Wilson, 33rd Batt., 320 points, 30 guineas and cup; Sergt. Short, G. G. F. G., 315 pts., £20; Pte. Duncan, 2nd Q. O. R., 310 pts., £15; Lieut. Chamberlain, 43rd Batt., 304, £15; Lieut. Dover, 78th Batt., 303, £10; Lieut. Smith, St. John Rifles, 302, £10; Capt. McMicking, 44th Batt., 302, £10; Lieut. Vaughan, 5th Royal Scots, 300, £10; Staff-Sergt. Ashall, 2nd Q. O. R., 299, £6; Lieut. Grey, G. G. F. G., 294, £5; Sergt. Adams, 285, £5; Capt. Zealand, 285, £5; Sergt. Case, Halifax G. A., 284, £5. In the grand aggregate, to which the Canada challenge trophy was attached, Staff-Sergt. Wilson earned £5, with a score of 320, and Sergt. Short £2, with 316. Private Fulton, of 13th Middlesex won the Queen's prize. His score was 280.

Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 18. Owing to an accident to the steamer City of St. John, Judge Smith has not yet arrived at Shelburne, and the trial of the petition against Gen. Laurie has been postponed till to-morrow. The Colchester Liberals to-day nominated A. G. Morrison to oppose Ex-Governor Archibald. Mr. Morrison is a son of the late Hon. Thos. Morrison and a partner of the city Recorder, Mr. MacCoy. While excavating beneath a building to-day, the shoring gave way, the building collapsed and John Malone, a septuagenarian and mason, was crushed to death. The Prohibitionists of Colchester have a meeting on the 26th to consider the advisability of placing a candidate in the field.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, July 18. It is understood that the writ for Colchester election will issue at once. Nominations, August 8th, and election, 15th. Sheriff Crowe is returning officer. Col. Herchmer, who arrived to-day, states that a considerable number of half-breeds from Batouche and other districts are moving into the Peace River District. In reference to general matters he says that prosperity reigns in the Northwest. The Indians are quiet and the crop outlook is magnificent.

Big Demonstration.

VERA CRUZ, July 18. The demonstration in the city of Mexico to-day, in honor of President Juarez, was the grandest ever seen there. Representatives of all the different organizations of Mexico participated. The procession marched through the principal streets to the tomb of Juarez. Orations were delivered, and representatives of different newspapers deposited wreaths on the tomb. The music was by twelve bands. President Diaz and members of the Cabinet visited the cemetery.

A Fracas.

QUEBEC, July 18. The Salvation Army, while at St. Foye last evening, were stoned by a French mob, and several severely injured. Several revolvers were drawn by Salvationists, and five shots were fired in quick succession amongst the crowd, which caused a general stampede. Most fortunately the shots did not strike anyone.

Imposing Demonstration.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 13. A fleet is assembling at Cronstadt to meet the Emperor William. The fleet consists of forty war ships with a number of corvettes and gunboats.

Academic Honors.

LONDON, July 18. Cambridge University to-day conferred honorary degrees upon Bishop Potter, of New York, and the Bishops of Minnesota and Fredericton, N. B.

The Fatal Volcano.

LONDON, July 18. A volcano eruption occurred at Mak-mate, Japan by which 400 persons were killed and 1,000 injured.
