ADVICES by telegraph have lately been received from Great Britain by some produce exporters here to the effect that oats have depreciated in value from 21s. to 19s. per qr—204 lbs. This represents a difference of 5 or 6 cents on the bushel, which of course tells up immensely on a large quantity of oats. We are pleased to learn that the majority of shippers in this city at least will not suffer greatly, as their cargoes were sold in most cases before the drop came. The decrease in price is probably due to an overabundant market. Possibly oats may go up again when the supply has been reduced.

SNOW from a north westerly direction fell in a moderate way yesterday—not sufficient for the runners.

THE Xmas greening in the St. M. ry's Episcopal church as usual was artistically arranged and looked beautiful. A number of appropriate mottoes were arranged on the walls showing master hands at this work.

THE Methodist church was very prettily decorated with spruce, greenery, ferns, flowers and mottoes for Christmas. Miss Helen Massey is deserving of great credit for establishing a precedent of an old-time Xmas cheer in that church.

A FIRE took place in a house belonging to Hon. B. Rogers Alberton last week which was situated just in the rear of his new store. Considerable damage was done to the wood work in the room used as a parlor. Mr. Alex. Urquhart went up Saturday in the interest of an insurance company to consider amount of damage.

WHILE Mr. John Williams of Lot 12, accompanied by Mr. James Grant was camping on the ice a few days ago from the shore near Mr. A. C. McFadyen's to the farm of Allen McInnis, the icy foundation gave way and Mr. Williams got a dip in ten feet of water. Mr. Grant being a powerful man succeeded in rescuing him from a watery grave. The cries for help were heard by the neighbors but before the latter came Mr. Grant at the imminent peril of his own life had rescued his drowning friend.

MR. ISAAC LEWIS has been carrying on an extensive business in packing oels at Bidford. His operations were done in the oyster fishing establishment of Mr. John Dwyer, who last year shipped over 1000 bbls of oysters. Mr. Lewis has done a thriving trade, having already put up two tons of oels. A few nights ago, fire or steam was observed rising from the roof of the building. Mr. Martin McDonald fortunately noticed the strange appearance of the atmosphere over the building, and gave the alarm. Happily no serious damage was done. It seems a defective stove was the cause of the trouble which might have led to a big conflagration.
