### Farm Prices & Market Report

Following are excerpts from the weekly marketing report of the Provincial Department of Agriculture:

Farmers should arrange, at a very early date, for their seed requirements if it is felt that their own seed is not suitable. It will be found that, due to discoloration, most of our seed oats will be No. 2 grade, but that should not deter any producer from securing this grade if its germination and its quality otherwise is satisfactory.

Oats is still being picked up at around 65c to 70c per bushel, although some mills are paying 90c and better for good feed grain. Oats has been sold at entirely too low a level this fall, and in view of prices for Western grains there is no justification for the prices being paid for good sound oats in many instances.

Regarding the general picture on other seeds, alfalfa production will be less than one-half of that of 1950, and the smallest since 1943. Harvesting conditions on the Prairies is the cause. On the other hand one of the largest crops of red clover seed on record is expected, and will be over three times as large as last year. There should consequently be a small supply of good high-quality red clover seed for sale.

There has been a much larger production in the Maritimes than last year, over six times the quantity being produced. On the other hand, Alaska, which originates in Alberta, is definitely down. It is also interesting to note that the production of timothy seed in Canada is only a little better than one-half that of the 1950 production, which, by the way, was a record yield.

The Maritimes again report an increase over 1950. Two years ago there was a lot of timothy seed saved on Prince Edward Island—not so much last year. It would seem to me that there is an important production for this our farm people in both timothy and red clover seed. A saving of these products is a great insurance in farm production as well as a great saving in costs.

On other lesser seed crops there has been a slightly downward revision on estimates. In the production of nearly all kinds of vegetable and root seeds it is less than in 1950, particularly with reference to beet, mangel, onion, and spinach seed. The dry weather in British Columbia during the past season took its toll on seed production.

With regard to turnip seed, it is felt that the position will be fairly favourable in the Maritimes, although the harvesting weather was deplorable and affected, to a very great extent, production on Prince Edward Island.

Dealers are advised not to neglect necessary supplies of seeds of all kinds until late in the season. This is an important matter which should be attended to at the earliest possible moment.

The price of butter remains steady on the Halifax market during the past week, with factory prices being quoted at 66c for first grade prints delivered, and local jobbing 68c. On the Montreal market the price of butter is growing stronger, and is being quoted now at 65 1-2c for No. 1 solids delivered, this quotation is under date of November 21. On the Toronto market the price, November 19, was nominally 65 1-2c delivered.

There was no price change reported during the week for the Province of New Brunswick, and quotations for all points in that province are — creameries and wholesalers 1 and 2-lb. prints 66c, wholesalers to retail stores 1 and 2-lb. prints 68c. In this Province, creamery operators and salesmen favoured an upward adjustment in prices in order to bring them in line with that of other provinces and as a consequence the wholesale price is now being quoted at 64 1-2c delivered in Charlottetown, with local jobbing at 66c.

The demand is reported fair, with a greater tendency toward the purchase of solids. The output of butter in the province of
