DIPHTHERIA is spreading throughout the city.

AYOUB KHAN has appealed to the Shah of Persia for aid against the British.

PARTIES in arrears for dog tax are being summoned before the Stipendiary Magistrate.

THE schooner *Camillon* has arrived from Boston with a cargo of apples in bulk for Messrs. Dean Bros.

NAVIGATION of the Baltic is being rapidly closed by ice. An early and severe winter is anticipated.

THE coroner's jury in the Malone-McFarlane shooting case, in St. John, returned a verdict of murder against Malone.

THE telegram ordering up the storm drum, which left Toronto yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, only reached here this morning at 9 o'clock.

By telegraph to M. Foley, the barque "Valencia," Kickham, Master, arrived at Sydney, from Liverpool, after a passage of eleven days.

MAJOR FREELAND has issued a memorandum to all militia captains, forbidding Rifle practice on Kensington Rifle Range until further notice.

UNHAPPY IRELAND—Said a Rev. gentleman in Montreal, speaking of the state of Ireland, that the Green Isle contained "every faction—but satisfaction."

It is rumored that Sir Wm. Harcourt, Home Secretary, is to be made Speaker of the British House of Commons, in place of Rt. Hon. Mr. Brand, who will be made a Peer.

POTATOES.—The *Halifax Herald* says: "At auction, on Friday last, 2,000 bushels of P. E. Island potatoes brought from 16 to 18 cents; while New Brunswick potatoes realized 21 cents."

THE *M. A. Starr* left Halifax on Friday afternoon for this port, but when off George's Island was obliged to return, owing to a leak in her main steam pipe. She will sail again to-morrow.

ACADEMY OF MUSIC.—After a brief sojourn in the country, the Lindley Company resume a short season with "Aurora Floyd" this evening. This is Mrs. Braddon's masterpiece and should draw a full house, being its first presentation on the Island.

THE annual meeting of the Caledonian Club of P. E. Island, for the election of officials for the ensuing year will be held at the Club rooms (cor. Queen and Water streets,) to-morrow, Tuesday evening, at 8 o'clock.

THE New York "Sun" says that the Republicans have done many things that will not help them on the way to heaven; and it acknowledges that there have been some practices on the Democratic side not altogether saintly.

THE *Patriot* now professes sympathy with Mr. MacNab, whom it lately dubbed a murderer. The *Patriot* is, however, mistaken. Mr. MacNab, was not, we believe, dismissed from the service of the Government.

THE New York "World" has a telegram from Ottawa stating among other things that the Dominion Parliament is to meet for the consideration of the Pacific railway matter on the first Thursday in December, that it will adjourn over the Christmas holidays and re-assemble early in January for the transaction of ordinary business.

CRIME is apparently rampant in St. John N. B. The stabbing of Mr. Lawson, and the shooting of McFarlane by a policeman, is quickly followed by a second stabbing affray. On Friday at noon two sailors named Pieter and Hutton, on board a barque got quarrelling and finally engaged in a rough and tumble fight. Pieter becoming worsted, pulled a knife and stabbed Hutton in the right breast, the knife penetrating the lung. Pieter was arrested, and the wounded man was taken to the hospital. His wounds, it was thought, might prove fatal.

TELEPHONES.—We are glad to find that this interesting and very useful article is beginning to find place in our midst. Dropping into Millner's Tin Shop the other day, we saw several telephones in the course of preparation. Berry, Lucius Tuttle and Geo. Thomson, of the Eastern Railway; F. E. Boothley, of the Maine Central Railway; P. W. Cram, Superintendent of the E. & N. A. Railway; and J. P. Leavitt, General Ticket Agent of the E. & N. A. Railway, accompanied by Messrs. MacNab and Archibald. They returned to the city on Saturday evening, and left by Pictou boat this morning. They will visit Halifax before going home. They speak highly of what they saw of the Province and were particularly pleased with the treatment they received at the hands of "mine host" of the Rankin.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.
GIBSON, Nov. 5.
Mr. P. A. Logan will vacate the office of Mechanical Superintendent of the Railway here on Saturday evening. His successor, Mr. Jesse Mathews, at present a resident of Fredericton, with large mechanical experience obtained in the United States and the Provinces, commenced his duties today. The sudden change adds additional interest to the general excitement.

EUROPEAN.
DUBLIN, Nov. 5.
All the agitators who were indicted have been served with summonses.
At a Land League meeting yesterday, Parnell said he had reason to believe that the Government desired to postpone the trial until January term which would prevent those traversers who are members of Parliament from taking their seats at the meeting of Parliament in February. Parnell complained of being watched by detectives. He said if they followed him to his home he would have them put in the river. He gave a long account of the law of conspiracy which he said was obsolete. He urged the branches of the Land League to send contributions for the defence. Parnell, in the course of his speech, made a personal attack on Forster.

The state prosecutions against the indicted members of the Land League commence at two o'clock to-day, when the Counsel for the Crown will apply for adjournment until January.
A great indignation meeting will be held at Raithdown on Sunday.
An appeal by the Land League to the people of Ireland will be published this afternoon.

LONDON, Nov. 5.
The Channel squadron has been ordered to the coast of Ireland on Tuesday.

PARIS, Nov. 5.
Tribunal of conflicts confirmed decrees obtained by Prefects of departments of Nord and Valenciennes with the object of changing venue in the action brought by the Jesuits against the Prefects to recover possession of their houses from the departmental tribunals to council of state already obtained.
Lord Lyons, British Ambassador, has asked Minister Constans to grant authorization to English passionists in Paris and English benedictines in Douani. M. Constans consented.

UNITED STATES.
BOSTON, Nov. 5.
The latest returns make it certain that California has been carried by the Republicans by over 2,000. This being the case, Garfield will have 219 electoral votes and Hancock 150. The next House will be Republican. Counting Smith, who defeated Clittenden, as Republican, without the aid of any Greenbackers elected by the aid of the Republicans, their strength will not be less than 151 votes, while that of the Democrats, Greenbackers and Readjusters will be 142. The political complexion of the Senate will depend upon the Legislatures of California and Tennessee. In the latter the Democrats claim a small majority, but their count includes several Independents. Ex-Senator Dorsey says that if Fair of Nevada is elected to the Senate he will act with the Republicans. The Legislature of California is Republican.

Rumors were in circulation last evening that the National Democratic Committee was engaged in preparing a protest against counting the vote of New York. The fact appears to be that Barnum's committee is making charges of illegality in the election of New York, based upon the fact that Commissioner Davenport prevented voting on fraudulent naturalization papers issued by Tweed and the courts in 1867 and 1868, and of fraudulent voting.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.
Bark W. A. Hoicomb, of Bath, Me., is a total loss at Jones Inlet, near Far Rockaway, with a cargo of sugar. The latter is valued at \$150,000. The wreck is buried in the sand and is going to pieces.
By negligence of a switchman, who has fled, a passenger train and freight train collided at Jersey tunnel this morning. David Quackebush, engineer, and conductor Vothis were killed. No passengers injured.
A London fog now envelops the city as well as the bay and rivers.
