NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Not much activity now in the the Fishery Protection Service! There is an election in the wind.

—For the present, there seems to be an end to the great Nicaragua canal scheme. The plant of the Company has been seized by the Government of Nicaragua.

—The report of the salmon fishing operations in British Columbia for 1899 shows a catch of 36,744,912 pounds, an increase of 13,102,460 pounds over 1898.

—The Kingson Times thinks the Liberals may have a reduced majority in the next Parliament, but they will have a majority, upon which the Montreal Gazette remarks that "even those who are inclined to be friendly to the Laurier Government see that it is a losing cause."

—Durban, in Natal, of which we heard a great deal in the early stages of the war, received its name from General Sir Benjamin D'Urban, who died in Montreal in 1849. The general fought in South Africa, and was afterwards commander of the forces in British North America.

—While the Toronto Globe is lauding Mr. Sifton to the skies, as the ablest man in Canada, the Winnipeg Tribune (anti-boodle Liberal) pronounces him "a national affliction," and adds that "through his incapacity, or worse, millions of public treasure have been wasted, and his political methods and ideals have tended to further degrade the tone of our politics."

—The Ottawa Journal remarks that considering that brother Tarte made a valiant display of the independence of Canada in connection with a mere visit from a British commissioner to the Canadian exhibit at Paris, he seems to have displayed a lamb-like spirit when the French authorities ordered him to open the Canadian doors Sundays or they would break them in."

—A staff correspondent of the Montreal Star, writing from Paris under date of July 22nd, relates the following incident: The next blow to my self-esteem as a Canadian was the result of a conversation carried on between two Frenchmen at the exhibition, in tones loud enough to be overheard by all in their immediate vicinity. A group of Arabs or Ethiopians was seen entering the Canadian pavilion.

"Who are they?" asked one of the Frenchmen. "They must be Canadians," replied the other. "Really! But Canadians are not black?" the first one asked doubtfully. "Oh, yes, some of them are," glibly replied his informant, whose dictum was apparently accepted as final.

This, in the "chere-mere-patrie" of the hon. the Minister of Public Works. —Most solemnly in his London election speech did Sir Wilfrid Laurier promise us preferential trade. Then he campaigned against it in England. Now his organ says:—If you want it, you had better go and stump Great Britain in its behalf. To this the Montreal Star aptly responds that a campaign in England "would not be successful so long as the British electors could reply to the Canadian who advocated a mutual preference within the Empire:—Your own Government and a large majority of the members of your own Parliament are not in favor of such an arrangement." The campaigning must first be done in Canada. When the Canadian people have shown their desire for a preference in the British market, by electing to Parliament a large majority pledged to do their utmost to obtain such a preference, then the campaign in England will begin."

—The Halifax Herald contains a long article on North Sydney from which we clip the following notice of one of the many successful men from P. E. Island: "A. C. Bertram has been editor and proprietor of the North Sydney Herald for a quarter of a century, and it is but fair to say that no weekly in the maritime provinces during the period of time has been its superior as a vigorous and newsy paper. It has a reputation beyond the confines of Cape Breton, as probably no provincial paper issued weekly has a wider circulation abroad. Mr. Bertram has for the past 12 years filled the position of inspector of fisheries for Cape Breton Island, and it is admitted that he has been a very efficient and successful administrator of his department. He has always taken an active part in the business advancement of North Sydney, being connected with a number of enterprises prosecuted in the town and vicinity. He was elected mayor of the town by acclamation in 1898 and again in 1899, and during his tenure of office proved an excellent chief magistrate, being constantly watchful of the public interests."

—The Greeks cherish a grateful memory of the labors of Hon. W. E. Gladstone in their behalf, and have erected a statue in his honor in front of the Athens university. It was unveiled on Saturday, July 7th, in the presence of the king, Prince Nicholas, Mr. Strong, British charge d'affaires, the staff of the British legation, and the principal authorities. The rector of the university, M. Krassas, in a speech referred to the great service rendered to Greece by Mr. Gladstone and the grateful recollection in which his memory was held by the people. The students and the assembled crowd received the speech with loud cheers. All the Athenian newspapers published articles expressing gratitude to Great Britain and recalling Mr. Gladstone's Pre-Hellenic work. On the base of the statue there is engraved a Greek inscription the translation of which is as follows: "To a part of Epirus and to Thessaly, thou great the sacred light of freedom, averting slavery; Hellas, mindful of this boon, has raised his statue to thee, Gladstone, whose glory is immortal."

—The Prince of Wales never misses attending divine service, whether in town or country, at home or abroad. He is happiest at the church in Sandringham Park, and an American who once saw him there taking part in the service described him as "quite a notable psalmist, joining with evident enjoyment in such hymns as Onward, Christian Soldiers, his voice being easily distinguished by reason of its sonorous character and the tremendous roll which he gives to the 'r.'"

LIVE STOCK IMPROVEMENT.

Mr. Hodson's Scheme of Organization Approved at Montague.

Mr. Hodson, Dominion Live Stock Commissioner finished his tour of this province at Montague Bridge, where he addressed an influential and representative audience, Mr. Dewar, of New Perth, occupying the chair, and Mr. S. Martin acting as Secretary. Dr. Bethick, who accompanied Mr. Hodson, on being first called upon addressed the meeting on the very interesting subject of tuberculosis and its preventive. Mr. Hodson was then introduced and in a pleasing manner addressed the meeting along the lines already set forth in THE EXAMINER.

The chairman then referred to some disabilities the P. E. Island farmer had to contend with in recent years in the matter of supplying the varying requirements of the local pork-packing trade, after which the following gentlemen briefly addressed the meeting in the order named: A. C. McDonald, M. P., G. Boyver, J. M. Martin, James Clow, Dr. Robertson and G. B. Aitken.

The unanimous vote of thanks moved by Mr. Clow and seconded by Dr. Robertson on being tendered was fittingly acknowledged. The following resolution was then put to the meeting and carried, having been moved by F. G. Boyver and seconded by G. B. Aitken:

Resolved that we endorse the scheme of organization outlined by Mr. Hodson regarding provincial live stock, dairy and fruit growers' associations, also his suggestions re the organization of local farmers' institutes.

Ashanti Expedition.

BEKWA, Ashanti, August 2.—Major M. R. Beddoes with 400 men and two guns, started July 24, to locate the enemy's war camp. The camp was found, the warriors numbering 3,000 to 4,000 men, three days marching east of Dempoessi. Several hours fighting resulted in the defeating of the Ashantis, after a stubborn resistance. Major Beddoes' losses were heavy. He and Lieutenants Phillips and Swaby were severely wounded. Thirty men were also wounded. More troops will be necessary before the campaign can possible finish.

PRETORIA, Aug. 5.—A Pretoria merchant, a Hollander, was despatched to Europe several months ago with £80,000 with which to purchase foodstuffs for the burghers. He has not since been heard of.
