Leaves To Resume Service With Navy

Enquiries from persons requesting tourist literature for Prince Edward Island during the month of April totalled 1,187 or almost twice as many as were received during the previous month, it was disclosed here yesterday by Mr. George V. Fraser, Director of the Provincial Government's Tourist and Information Branch.

A breakdown of the figures show that 919 of the inquiries came from the United States, 367 from Canadian points and 56 from other parts of the world. In addition the Travel Bureau mail contained an average of a dozen letters daily from school children asking for literature.

Eighty of those who wrote from United States centres stated definitely that they would be spending their holiday on Prince Edward Island this summer. Canadians who said they were definitely holidaying in the Province this coming summer totalled 82.

Home on leave after seven months in Korean waters is A-B Ted Malone, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Malone, 130 Dorchester street. A-B Malone sailed from the Naval base at Esquimaux last July on H.M.C.S. Cayuga.

In the Navy only one and one-half years, he is still a veteran at 21. Ted joined the Merchant Navy when he was only 14 and saw service in the last war on five different ships. He joined the Canadian Navy late in 1949 and last July they got their sailing orders for the Far Eastern war theatre. He was the only Islander on the Cayuga, but says he met a couple of others who were on the Athabaska. He remembers them only as Able Seaman MacLeod, whom he thinks is from Charlottetown, and Able Seaman Mayhew, Kensington.

Unable to give any information due to restrictions placed on interviews he did say that most of the time away was spent at sea and they saw some action. During his tour he visited in New York, Honolulu and Japan. Arriving home last month he expects to leave on return to report for duty the middle of this month.
