Quebec Govt. Accepts Lanctot's Resignation

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) QUEBEC, July 3.—The resignation of Assistant Attorney General Charles Lanctot, K.C., has been accepted by the government, Premier Adélard Godbout announced early tonight. His successor will be chosen later, the Premier added. Mr. Lanctot is 71 years old and a veteran of 50 years service as a member of the Quebec bar. Former Attorney-General Perrault announced the deputy attorney-general had tendered his resignation to the government of Premier Taschereau last June 9. This was after Mr. Lanctot had appeared as a witness before the public accounts committee of the Legislative Assembly. His resignation became known a few hours after the former premier's brother, Antoine C. Taschereau, had resigned as accountant of the Legislative Assembly. He too was a committee witness. Appearing before the committee, Mr. Lanctot refused to answer questions of opposition leader Maurice Duplessis as to whether he had received fees from companies exploiting the province's natural resources, meantime acting in his government capacity. Mr. Lanctot entered government service in 1891 as special officer to superintendent public and private legislation before the Quebec Legislature. In 1895 he was appointed deputy attorney-general and served under Premier S. N. Parent, Premier Sir Lomer Gouin and lastly Premier Taschereau.

Missionary Rally At Montague

A very successful Rally of the W.M.'s Missionary Society for King's County was held in Montague United Church, Friday, June 26th. Although the weather was most unfavorable more than sixty-five delegates from the different Auxiliaries were present. The afternoon session opened at 2.30. The president Mrs. M. McLean in the chair. The Georgetown Auxiliary took charge of the worship period; Mrs. Stirling giving a very inspiring address on the Kingdom of Love. This was followed by an address of welcome by Mrs. Leslie McDonald; Mrs. Leard of Souris responded. Letters of greeting were read from the different Secretaries who were unable to attend. Mrs. Pritchard Charlottetown, Supply Sec'y, stressed the need of clothing for the children of our Trinidad Mission, shirts and dresses for boys and girls, four to twelve years of age. The parents only get two or three days work a week, at from twenty-five to thirty-five cents a day, so cannot afford to clothe their children. This is not necessary for warmth, in that climate, but they are not allowed to attend school unless clothed. She also said, if we could see the joy on the little faces at Christmas, if there was a doll or a string of beads, or even a bright card for them, we would be amply repaid for our trouble. She emphasized the need of warm clothing, such as blankets, quilts, mittens, socks, dresses and boots, for Labrador and the outposts of Newfoundland. Mrs. J. Matheson, Christian Stewardship Sec'y sent greetings. She asked "Do we count first, and the Master's work last?" Mrs. Baker, Sec'y Circles and Affiliated C. G. I. T. Groups also Mrs. MacQuarrie, Association Helpers Sec'y, sent Greetings. Mrs. Russel Woodside of Lot 16, spoke on Berwick Camp, and the wonderful work they are doing. A very enjoyable part in the program, was a drill, by eight Mission Band children. Mrs. Archie Hume in charge. A solo by Bill Burden brought this part to a close. Mrs. Hockin of Souris, conducted the Open Forum. Mrs. Woodside took charge of the quiet half-hour, asking for her subject "The Kingdom of God." This brought the afternoon session to a close. The evening meeting was at eight o'clock. Mrs. E. Alken of St. Peter's presided. Rev. Mr. Gouge of Murray River led in prayer, followed by two very beautiful solos. "There is a Green Hill Far Away" by Miss Margaret Coffin, and Rev. Mr. Long sang "Just For Today", which were greatly enjoyed. Rev. Mr. Boyce from Mt. Annual Meeting North Wiltshire Shipping Club

A seventy-five per cent increase in volume of business compared with the previous years was announced Thursday night at the annual meeting of North Wiltshire Livestock Shipping Club. Prices during the past year were also reported "much higher" than in 1934. Mr. Walter Clark presided at the meeting. Addresses were made by Mr. J. A. Gillies, Secretary of the Livestock Marketing Board and Mr. H. W. Clay of the Dominion Livestock Branch. The following board of directors was elected: Messrs. E. Howatt, Allan McLeod, Frank Easter, D. McGlinchey, Harry Paul, William Clarke and Walter Clarke. Messrs. E. Howatt and Roland Easter were appointed as delegates to the annual meeting of the livestock marketing board. Mr. J. A. Gillies, Secretary of the Livestock Marketing Board, in his address drew the attention of the meeting to the fact that the Marketing Board would be operating under the recently enacted Incorporation Act after July 1st of this year, and presented the constitution drafted in conformity with the terms of the Incorporation legislation approved unanimously by the constitution and appointed delegates to attend the annual meeting which will take place about the middle of July. Mr. H. W. Clay of the Dominion Livestock Branch addressed the meeting on feeds and feeding practices. He emphasized that animal production required certain elements, necessary to animal growth and without which it could not be expected that livestock production could be made profitable. He drew the attention of the audience to the fact that practically every farmer in Prince Edward Island was familiar with the fertilizer composition required for potato and other crop growth, and stated how a shortage in any one element required, would mean a decreased yield and a definite percentage of wasted effort on the part of the producer. The same principle applied in animal feeding. Quite a number of questions were asked, to which the speaker responded, giving considerable valuable information.

Ex-Seaman Accused Of Selling Information To Japanese Agent

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LOS ANGELES, July 3.—A picture of how a Japanese secret agent peered into the steel passageways of the United States battles fleet through the eyes of a former navy seaman was completed for a jury today by the prosecutors of Harry Thompson. Thompson, a curly-haired pink-cheeked ex-seaman, is accused of stealing important information about the warships and selling it to a Japanese agent. In testimony high-lighted by the appearance of Thompson's Japanese "errand girl," these were the government's salient points: The Japanese Consul at Los Angeles was named as one of two men with whom Thompson attempted to communicate after he was arrested by United States naval intelligence officers. A picture of Toshio Miyazaki, whom the government asserts was the secret agent employing Thompson, was identified by two Stanford University students, and an employee of the Yokohama Specie Bank at San Francisco. As the prosecutor announced his case at an end, defence counsel moved the charge against Thompson be dismissed. Judge Leon Yankwich denied the motion. A diminutive and attractive Japanese girl, Janet Ono, appeared as a reluctant witness. A young man who accompanied her jumped to his feet at one point of the testimony and exclaimed: "What's the matter with you Janet?" "When was the last time you saw Thompson?" the girl was asked. "When he was in jail—I went with a girl friend," replied Miss Ono. "Did he ever ask you to run errands for him?" "Yes." "What were they?" She then said they were to take a message to Lennie Thompson, friend but no relative of the arrested man, and "a Mr. Hort in the Chamber of Commerce building." "He's the Japanese Consul in Los Angeles, isn't he?" "Yes, I think you are right." Miss Ono said she saw only the secretary to the consul, who said "I don't know Mr. Thompson."

Siamese Twin Joins Sister In Death

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MEDFORD, Mass., July 3.—Two days old Mary Florence, who lived 30 hours attached to her Siamese twin sister, joined her in death today. Mary only had a chance in 1,000,000 or so to live and destiny robbed her of that. American medical association records show only one case where a Siamese twin survived a dead mate and that was of the much more common variety, juncture at the base of the spine. Mary was united to her twin by a bony tissue which held their skulls together. So rare was that type of formation, that Dr. John Vernaglia, 31, who delivered Mary and her sister, said no similar case was known to medicine. Mary was born Wednesday to Mrs. Diego Florenza, 23 year old Everett mother of two other and normal children, and her grocery clerk husband.

Will Investigate Bribery Charge

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, July 2.—A committee of the Nova Scotia Exhibition Commission was appointed today to investigate charges that attempts had been made to bribe Dr. Edgar Watson of Toronto, judge at the Exhibition's horse show last year. In a letter to Dr. K. G. Mahabir, the official horse judge at the 1935 exhibition claimed that someone had offered him it would be "to my interest if a certain horse did not win". The letter also expressed Dr. Watson's sympathy in the death of the horse, Golden Fancy, which his owner, Dr. Mahabir valued at \$5,000. The horse had been poisoned. At the exhibition commission meeting today Secretary-Manager E. Frank Lordley tabled correspondence from Dr. Mahabir who called for investigation into the charge of attempted bribery. The following committee will conduct the probe: Mayor E. J. Craig of Halifax, Alderman P. A. Gough and Alderman J. F. McManus.
