MESSRS. BLAKE BROS., of this city, shipped on the steamer St. Lawrence to Halifax market yesterday, twenty head of cattle, weighing on average fourteen hundred pounds. They also shipped three superior bulls.

MORE deprecations have been committed in the Royalty by vicious dogs. Last night the flocks of the stock farm were attacked. Three prize ewes were killed, eight or nine others were worried and wounded, and eight lambs were killed and wounded.

THE Stipendiary Magistrate has taken measures to destroy all dogs found at large without a collar on which is the name of the owner; and we advise farmers to take measures to enforce the act which authorizes that all dogs found at large without their owner and without being properly clogged or muzzled shall be destroyed.

THE Football Club had quite an enthusiastic meeting last evening, at Citizen's Skating Rink. We direct members attention to the following article from the London Lancet:—"Now that the football season has come to an end, a timely opportunity occurs of drawing attention to the exceptional amount of danger run by the votaries of a much abused (in every sense of the word) form of amusement and exercise. Since October last we have taken the trouble to cut out the record of each case of accident at football that we have met with in the papers, without, be it noted, any special search for them. A list of accidents is here given, and the article continues:—"This list, which, of course, in no way represents the total amount of the season's football casualties, amply suffices to recall attention to the exceptionally dangerous nature of the game. No other popular game with which we are acquainted has the same amount of peril attached to it. It may be urged that accidents are bound to occur in all sorts and kinds of amusement, and that hunting is responsible for even worse and more frequent accidents than football. This may be so, but hunting is free from the objectionable element of personal conflict which pervades football. The game requires reform; we say reform, because we think it would be unwise, and, on the whole, undesirable, to follow a recent American proposal, and demand its prohibition in our schools. To put a stop altogether to the principal winter amusement of thousands of young people would, we are sure, be impossible. Nor is it needed; for football, under such restrictions as would reduce the number and severity of these frequent accidents, is capable of far more good than harm. What those restrictions should be is not for us to decide, but we should venture to call attention of the Rugby Union and the Association authorities to 'collaring' and 'charging' respectively. Reform there must be, for the game is still only too well described by an old writer as 'a friendly kind of fight rather than a play or recreation—a bloody and murthering practice rather than a fellowly sport or pastime.'

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Anglo-Russian War Cloud Darkening.

Rumored Collapse of Negotiations.

AN OUTBREAK PREDICTED.

LONDON, May 21.
In the House of Lords to-day the Marquis of Salisbury, in a speech, said it is now quite evident that diplomacy is useless to stop the Russian advance towards India. England's true policy is to mass all available troops north of the Indian frontier, and fortify all other frontiers. He taunted Gladstone for the wanton loss of life and money in the Sudan campaign, which was a humiliating failure.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 21.
It is rumored here that the Anglo-Russian negotiations have collapsed. An outbreak is predicted in Macedonia and Bulgaria which will soon set Europe in flames.

LONDON, May 20.
Lord Randolph Churchill moved a resolution of two millions for the purpose of calling attention to Saturday's blue book on the Penjdeh incident. He said the indignation aroused by a perusal of the despatches was not confined to the Tory party but shared by the country at large, and even by Liberal newspapers. He maintained that M. DeGiers has said nothing to justify Gladstone's statement in Parliament that it had been agreed that no further advance should be made on either side. He declared Gladstone's statement of March 13th was a fiction and a phantom without the smallest justification. After some further discussion, Lord Randolph asked leave to withdraw the motion.

The suggestion of further difficulty with Russia is furnished by a report which is to the effect that the Russian government has demanded and obtained from Persia the release of Ayoub Khan. This veteran intriguer and former ameer of Afghanistan, was arrested early last month by the Shah at the solicitation of the British Consul at Teheran who had information that Ayoub was about to be employed by Russia to foment a rising against the Ameer Abdurrahman with the view of Ayoub's ultimately occupying the throne as a Russian tool. Ayoub has been detained as a semi-prisoner at Teheran since April 11, notwithstanding the latest report indicates that Russia has got tired of protesting and being satisfied that England's complacency will stretch to any limit, she has altered her tone to one of command. If it be true that the Shah has released Ayoub upon Russia's demand, it is significant as proving that British prestige among the Asiatics is crumbling. The London Times, referring to the Afghan papers, says much useless correspondence and mischievous irritation would have been avoided if the government had discovered earlier that the Ameer did not want Penjdeh. It was a fatal error on the part of England and the Ameer.

It is authoritatively stated that Russia demands Maruchak and Zulficar Pasa, possession of which the Ameer considers vital to the integrity of the Afghan Frontier.
Advices from Tirpud say that the Ameer in a proclamation compliments the Afghan troops on the gallantry at Penjdeh and lays great stress on the value of the British alliance. Reinforcements are said to be daily arriving at Herat.

THE Franchise Bill.
OTTAWA, May 21.
In the House of Commons to-day, Sir John Macdonald will amend the Franchise Bill by proposing that the qualification for voters on real property in cities, shall remain at \$300, and for voters on real property in towns \$200. To the clause relating to residence and income, Sir John proposes to add, "Derives an income from earning," and to change the amount from \$400 to \$300.

THE Irish Land Act.
LONDON, May 21.
Mr. Gladstone, in the House of Commons to-day, stated that the Government intended to amend the purchase clauses in the Irish Land Act in order to make them more acceptable to the Irish people.

GARRISONING CAIRO AND ALEXANDRIA.
CAIRO, May 21.
The troops from Suakin has been ordered to remain in Egypt and garrison Cairo and Alexandria.
