Largely Attended Funeral Yesterday

One of the largest funerals in this vicinity in many years was held yesterday when Major Otto W. Campbell, former member of the 105th Battalion and the P. E. I. Light Horse, was accorded full military honors.

The funeral service was held at his late home at Winsloe with interment in the family plot at People's Cemetery. Rev. Donald Campbell and Mr. Heber H. Hardy conducted the services at both the home and grave.

High ranking officers of the P. E. I. Regiment (successors to the P. E. I. Light Horse) attended in a body and also present was a military firing party under command of S. Q. M. S. Charles Ryan. The Last Post and Reveille were sounded by Trooper J. Neilson.

Present for the funeral services were members of all branches of the Armed Services as well as representatives of ranking Government divisions. Although a life-long member of the Liberal Party, the late Major Campbell was honored in death by members of the Progressive Conservatives headed by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, former leader.

Sympathy was offered surviving members of the family by both preachers in the service. They went to prepare a place for you and in the phrase "Death shall be swallowed up in victory." The speakers referred to his long wartime services to his country and to the lengthy suffering he had endured, "made lighter by the love of those near to him." They reminded the large gathering that grief comes to all, but that memory is the key which can unlock the door of forgetfulness and bring back the voices and faces of those who are gone.

Among the hymns sung during the service at home was a long time favorite of Major Campbell, "The Old Rugged Cross".

Legion Service At the conclusion of the service at the grave the Legion Service was held by Capt. Whiston Smith. The officers of the P. E. I. Regiment then paraded singly and combined to a smart salute and dropped a poppy on the coffin as it was being lowered. In the group were the Commanding Officer of the regiment, Lieut. Col. A. W. Rogers, Major John A. MacDonald, Second-in-Command, Major E. K. Kennedy, Major R. E. Mahar, Major Andrew MacRae, Capt. L. Caselty, M.C., Lieut. E. Peters, M.M., Lieut. L. W. Ford, Lieut. S. Campbell, and Lieut. A. Carr. Also present for the service and dropping a poppy on the coffin was Staff Sgt. Allan MacKay.

The honorary pall-bearers at the funeral were Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, Senator J. P. McIntyre, Col. G. E. Full, Major N. W. Lowther, Mr. Charles Earle and Mr. Cecil Miller. The active pall-bearers were Messrs. Stephen Holroyd, Stewart MacFarlane, Wallace Rodd, A. C. Duffett, Sidney Taylor and Reuben Good.

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Prospective Nominees At Lib. Convention

An exceptionally large number of candidates may seek nomination when the Liberals of Queen's County hold their convention on Oct. 25 to select two men to contest the Federal riding in the next Dominion election. The sitting members, both Conservatives, are Messrs. Chester S. McLure and J. Angus MacLean.

Among the Liberal names rumored are those of Mr. Cecil Miller, former candidate; Mr. F. R. Cormack, President of the Queen's County Liberal Association; Mr. W. R. LePage, a candidate in the last Provincial election; Mr. Nell A. Matheson, editor of The Patriot; Mr. Chester E. Shaw, retired chief inspector in the Fruit and Vegetable Division of the Federal Department of Agriculture; Mr. Rollie MacDonald; Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, and Mr. John Mustard, a former member of the Provincial Legislature.

Another name has been added to the list of possible nominees, a number of individual and delegation having requested Mr. Leo P. McIsaac, Mt. Edward Road, to let his name go before the convention. Former secretary and later research director for the P. E. I. Federation of Agriculture, Mr. McIsaac spent several months in Europe in 1950-51 after being awarded a scholarship to study European methods of marketing and co-operative management. He is at present engaged in organizing two new branches of the Co-op Services in the Province.

Tribute To Late Maj. O. W. Campbell

The following tribute to the late Major O. W. Campbell has been received from Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell: "His many friends throughout the province sincerely mourn the loss of one who in public circles came to be known affectionately as 'The Major.' Though he did not attain commission rank on active service, he had a long and outstanding service in the Canadian Army in the First World War, and in later years became a Major in the P.E. Island Light Horse.

"Following his discharge from the Army, he went back to the land. By persistent effort and scientific management he became a highly successful farmer of Winsloe.

"In 1936 he entered the Provincial Public Service as superintendent of Old Age Pensions, a position which he held until a year ago, when the new Pension system was established by the Dominion. Major Campbell's administration of the Old Age Pension Branch not only gave entire satisfaction in this province but was regarded throughout Canada as a model of efficiency.

"For the past year he has been Director of the Provincial office set up to administer pensions for those under the age of seventy.

"In 1940, when Col. F. S. Fielding was granted leave of absence to go on active service, Major Campbell assumed in addition to his Old Age Pension Office the duties of Acting Deputy Provincial Secretary and Treasurer and Clerk of the Executive Council. Those offices he held for about three years, and in those capacities he rendered eminently efficient service to the government of the day.

"As Premier at that time, I had many occasions to rely upon his kindly and competent advice in administrative matters. Innumerable government documents are indebted to him for the clear and appropriate manner in which he worded them.

"Major Campbell was particularly courteous to all members of the public with whom he had official dealings. Even those to whom he had to answer an official 'no' were grateful for the thoroughness and consideration which he accorded to all applications and requests.

"The people of Prince Edward Island have lost an exceptionally competent public official, and our sincere sympathy goes out to his sorrowing widow, son and daughter."

Junior Red Cross Official To Spend Week In Province

Miss Kathleen Herman, Assistant National Director of Junior Red Cross, arrived in Charlottetown last evening from Toronto and will spend this week in conference with the Director of Education, the School Supervisors, School Principals, High School pupils, Public Health officials and will visit a few rural schools. She will also address a meeting of the Charlottetown school teachers on Friday. Her itinerary while here has been planned by Miss Marie Bowness, Director of the Prince Edward Island Junior Red Cross.

Miss Herman, a native of Alberta, took her Public Health nursing at the University of Alberta, was a district nurse in the frontier edges of Alberta, and afterwards organized a School Health Unit throughout a large area in Northern Alberta where she had to work in close co-operation with educational authorities. In this capacity she gained a valuable insight into the School Health question and was attracted to Red Cross as a means of coping with the problems met in her Public Health work. She was the first Director of Junior Red Cross in Alberta, a position which she held for six years before being appointed as Assistant National Director in March of this year.

On Wednesday of this week, Miss Herman will be the guest speaker at the October meeting of the Prince Edward Island Red Cross.
