The captain says that the Magdalen fleet has not been very successful this spring, the largest catch being 240 seals.

Senators Prose, Arsenault and Macdonald arrived home from Ottawa on Saturday evening. It was understood that a motion would be made on Friday, adjourning the Senate until after the completion of the budget debate. The Senators will return to Ottawa when the Senate re-assembles.

Mr. Joseph A. Macdonald, who is about leaving Carleton Place for the United States, was recently presented with a very complimentary address, signed by the clergymen and business men of the place, and which he replied in appropriate terms. We regret that our space will not admit of the publication of the address and reply.

ATTEMPTED JAIL BREAKING.—Edward Flannigan, a prisoner in Queen's County Jail, was waiting trial in the Supreme Court on a charge of breaking and entering the premises of Herbert Stanway, made an unsuccessful attempt to break jail one night last week. Flannigan, who was confined in cell No. 8, cut the wood around the lock of the door leading into the Young cell adjoining and removed the lock and got from his cell into that apartment. He cut the door with an old knife, covering the opening made with paper and his coat. Once in Young's cell, Flannigan began cutting the stone wall in the hall between the cells, and was about half way through when he discovered in the morning by Jailer Harvie. Had he kept on working in the direction in which he was going he would have struck another part of cell No. 8 from which he had escaped.

The operations on the wall were carried on by the aid of a ladder taken from the wicket in the door of the Young cell. Flannigan must have been working all night endeavoring to get through to liberty, as the tools used were not calculated to expedite business. The damage is being repaired, and in the meantime Flannigan is confined in a cell for refractory prisoners.

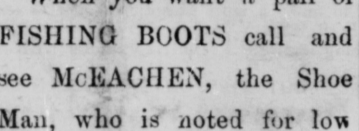
