For example, we are reminded that because we are living in our rapidly-moving, ceaselessly active 20th century we must constantly be on time for work, for an appointment, for our meals, for our favorite TV or radio program.
Time, we are told, is money. Time can make or break a man's career in this world. Why is time so precious? Because it always marches on. Each of its moments can be lived only once and can never be relived.
These summer weeks are called the time of vacation the time of leisure for millions of people on this continent. It is time of great change — a change from the crowded city blocks to the cottage at the lake, from the noisy factory to the trip through scenic countryside, from the monotonous duties

of housekeeping to the vacation lands of Canada and the U.S.
Yes, vacation time is no doubt one of the most pleasant and welcomed changes of the year. If that is so, let it not be wasted time. Let it not consist of lost weeks and lost week ends, in which much harm can come to our souls and in which hard-earned money is spent lavishly and foolishly.
TIME VALUABLE
