AN OBJECTION CONSIDERED.

We have heard it objected that the mails arriving by the Princess in the morning cannot possibly be sorted in time to be despatched to the country by the morning trains. If this be so, we feel sure that it will not be for lack of exertion on the part of Mr. Brecken and his staff. Certainly the best use will, in any case, have to be made of the morning hours,—all working together early, quickly and unitedly. Let us see how the matter stands. The Princess leaves Pictou at say 12.30 o'clock. In ordinary weather she will be here at 4.30, and the mails will be in the Post Office at five o'clock. A clerk or two on board the Princess on the way over ought to be able to have the letters sorted and ready for distribution into the country bags at that time. There will then be two hours and a half for work before the first train leaves; and a great many papers may be assorted by a willing staff in that time. But if it should be found that the time is not sufficient, we have little doubt that the Superintendent of the railway could hold the trains for a quarter or half an hour and yet, by forcing the pace a little, be able to make connections on time. Or if this should be impossible the letters, at least, and many of the papers could be forwarded by the morning trains and the balances by the afternoon trains, and would be still fourteen or fifteen hours in advance of the mails as sent heretofore. After all, the work of assorting and forwarding the mails has to be done in any case;—and it had better be done early than late. The difference is merely in point of time. That is to say the post office clerks who have heretofore been compelled to work late into the night will, so long as the new arrangement continues, rise early, take advantage of the exhilarating morning air, and rest in the evening. The heavy storms which occasionally occur at this season of the year may, of course, interfere with the regularity of the system. But apart from these, nothing can be more certain than that Captain McLean and his Princess will regularly deliver the mails at Charlottetown; and if so we may rely upon the Post Office officials to do the rest. It need not be said that delay of the mails in Charlottetown will be just as disgraceful as delay upon the Mainland.

MR. BARTLETT'S LECTURE.

The popularity of the lecture course of the Y. M. L. A., of St. James' church, as well as the high appreciation in which the lecturer is held, were abundantly evidenced by the audience which gathered to hear Mr. Bartlett in St. James' Hall last evening. Leading his audience hither and thither through modern Rome, the lecturer skillfully awakened an interest in the Eternal City which was so intensified as the lecture proceeded that there were few present who did not feel the solemnity of treading upon holy ground. The matchless shrine of St. Peter, with its stupendous proportions, combined with perfect symmetry, was presented in such a manner that the spirit of devotion enshrined in its costly magnificence seemed to breathe through the audience room, and all learned more fully to understand and appreciate the fervor which, year by year, draws an innumerable concourse of pilgrims to the basilica of Rome.

The varied treasures of that palace of palaces, The Vatican, were barely touched upon, no lecture being adequate to do more than to refer to a few of the treasures of its inexhaustible collection. The series of views presented illustrate several of the choicest gems of the wondrous city; and too much cannot be said in praise of the skillful manner in which they were thrown upon the screen while under Mr. Bartlett's vivid word-painting they glowed with life. A well-earned vote of thanks, moved by T. C. James Esq., and seconded by Rev. D. B. McLeod, of Orwell, seemed to us to be only defective in one thing—it made no mention of Mr. A. E. Morrison, who so skillfully manipulated the stereopticon. We hope that the day is not far distant when Mr. Bartlett will give Charlottetown another instalment of the beauties of the seven-hilled city.
