Mr. Palmer will speak to-night and Rev. Mr. Brewer on Friday evening. NOVA SCOTIA'S PARLIAMENT.—The Provincial Legislature of Nova Scotia was prorogued on Monday. His name is Joseph Labelle. APPLAUSE IN CHURCH.—For the first time in the history of the Calvary Baptist church of New Haven, Conn., the congregation interrupted the pastor, Rev. Mr. Potat, on Sunday night during his sermon. Mr. Potat was one of the ministers who accompanied the police last week on a raid of respectable houses in the town. On Sunday night he alluded to the inefficiency of the police, whom he intimated had notified the gambling houses of the proposed raids. Before he had finished, the congregation clapped their hands and created such demonstrations as have never been seen in a church in that city before. SAW STRANGE LIGHTS.—Capt. Corning, of the British schooner W. and H. Mortherpoon, which arrived at New York from Port Franklin a few days ago, reports a peculiar phenomenon when his vessel was in the Gulf Stream on the west coast of Florida. He says he saw strange lights that in a long and varied sea-faring experience he never saw before. Apparently the lights would rise from the water and ascend to a height of about twenty-five feet, and then, after a report similar to an explosion, would go out. Captain Corning has no explanation to make of this strange phenomenon, but is positive that he did see the lights. INDEFINITELY POSTPONED.—Two applications were made to the Provincial Secretary this morning for license to join the noble army of Benedictines. The applicants were accompanied by their best men who were willing to enter into the usual bond that the contracting parties were without the lines of consanguinity, and that the governor would be held harmless in the premises. A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

At about six o'clock Thursday evening a man and three horses hurled through a bridge. At about six o'clock Thursday evening William L. Peck, with a three-horse team load of wood was crossing the Menzel bridge, situated a short distance from Hopewell Hill, near Albert, N. B., a structure about 50 feet high, with a span of 100 feet in length. The bridge suddenly dropped and Mr. Peck, his three horses and their load, went crashing into the terrible depth below. Men who heard the noise at a long distance rushed to the scene of the accident, and were much surprised and pleased to find Mr. Peck in a conscious condition and able to talk with them. He was taken to his home at Hopewell Hill, and Drs. Murray, of Albert, and Lewis, of Hillsboro, were summoned. On examination they found no bones broken but a severe cut on one thigh. Two of the horses were killed in the fall and buried in among the timbers of the bridge. The third horse, it is thought, will recover, though hurt considerably. That Mr. Peck was not killed is a great wonder.
