Red Cross Aid Is Announced

According to information just received by the P.E.I. Red Cross, the Canadian Red Cross Society has given \$10,000 to aid the Indian Red Cross in its emergency feeding programmes.

The cash grant was authorized by John Partridge, chairman of the national executive committee, while attending a Red Cross meeting in Winnipeg.

The appeal from New Delhi through the League of Red Cross Societies outlined the serious food in many parts of India and the need for financial support for supplementary feeding of infants, young children and expectant and nursing mothers.

Town Council Holds Meeting

GEORGETOWN — The regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Town Council was held on Monday night in the Council Chambers, with Mayor Howard S. MacLean presiding and Councillors Lavers, Currie, McConnell, MacDonald and MacLean attending.

The financial report for March was presented by Councillor Lavers and following discussion was adopted. Bills amounting to \$286 were certified as paid and bills amounting to \$51 were approved for payment. It was decided that the account now known as the Water and Sewage Account be changed to be known as the Capital Expenditure Account and will contain all Capital Expenditure amounts.

Councillor Currie reporting for the Welfare and Street Light Committee, stated that there were no new applications for additional street lights. One welfare recipient had welfare payments extended to July 9th.

Councillor McConnell reporting for Public Property stated that the rink shutters would be repaired and other matters relating to the rink closing would be attended to. He pointed out that certain repairs would be necessary to the rink building before next season.

Councillor MacLeod reporting for the fire hall committee, stated that repairs would have to be made to the fire hall door. In the absence of Councillor Johnson, the police report was given by the town policeman, Allison Grover, who gave a day-by-day report of his activities for the month. The sum of \$33 had been collected in fines for March. Discussion took place regarding the engaging of an assistant for the weekends and the matter was referred to the police committee for further action.
