OFF ON BUSINESS.—Mr. W. W. Wellner, jeweler, left this morning on a business trip to Boston and other American cities, he intends visiting the large jewelry centres in search of the newest creations in jewelry and silver novelties.

STEAMERS MOVEMENTS.—The Princess Diana the round trip yesterday bringing the Nova Scotia mail.

VICTORIOUS ARTILLERY.—A photograph of the victorious shifting ordnance team of 1884, framed for the Artillery Orderly Room, was shown THE EXAMINER'S reporter to day. Of the team some have left the service, others have gone abroad, and two or three have "passed through the valley of the shadow of death." Sgt. Rufus Macdonald, who was killed at Quebec a few years later whilst performing the shift, occupies a prominent position in the group.

THE QUEEN'S JUBILEE.—It is pleasing to hear that the Mayor and City Councilors have not been idle in the matter of preparing to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee. They have requested the various societies to assist in the celebration, and a meeting to see what can be done is to be held tomorrow night. They have also asked the school children to participate. The firemen and military will also take part. It is also probable that the formal opening of the Park Roadway will be a feature of the celebration.

McLeod rendered a sacred solo in her usual excellent manner, and there was also a vocal quartette and a chorus by the choir. The address was under the auspices of the Woman's Missionary Society.

We regret to learn that Mrs. Daniel McDonald who has been very ill does not seem to improve very rapidly.

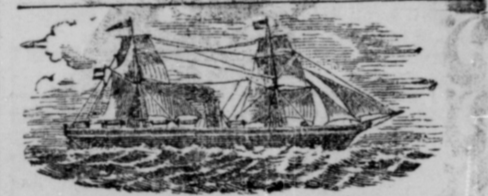

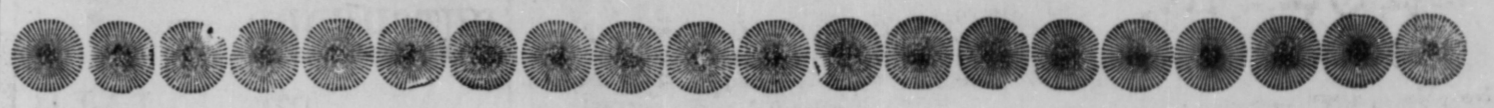

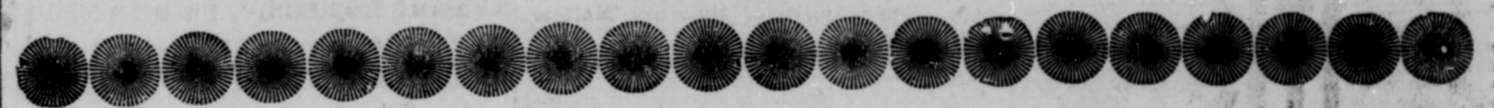
