## N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The great bull market in stocks was pounded down last week in its first real test, and it rebounded vigorously. On the final day of the week, the stock market retraced 40 per cent of the average loss of the two previous days. For nearly 16 months, the stock market has been advancing steadily. Wall Street brokers and others were worried about the swiftness of the rise. There also was worry in Washington.

## RAISED MARGIN

On Tuesday, after the stock markets had closed, the federal reserve board in Washington raised margin requirements to 60 per cent from 50 per cent. It meant that you now have to put up a minimum of 60 per cent of your own money when you buy stocks on margin.

The real meaning of the margin boost was quite plain in Wall Street: The federal reserve board was concerned over the husky bull market behavior.

The next day the stock market cracked wide open. Volume was 4,440,000 shares.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined \$3.40, the most for one session since the outbreak of the Korean war. Thursday's volume was 5,300,000 shares, greatest in more than 15 years. The average, however, was down only \$1.60.

Those who sold out stood by to await the time when quoted stocks would sink to bargain levels. Friday there was a buying rush, and prices soared.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks climbed \$2.00—an estimated two billion dollars in quoted value—and in one day regained 40 per cent of the two-day loss.

Brokers aren't saying that the decline has ended. There still is a possibility that the market could dip once more to determine whether there is underlying buying support before it takes off again in its old bull manner.

Canadian issues closed the week higher. Leading the rise up 1 at 35 1/8, was Canadian Pacific. Other advances were McIntyre up 3/4, International Nickel up 1/2, Dome Mines and Hiram Walker each ahead 1/4. Distillers Seagram remained unchanged.

Royalite Oil was up 1/2 on the American stock exchange and Lake Shore gained 1/8. Giant Yellowknife slipped 1/8.

## U.S. Steel

**CLEVELAND (AP)**—The steel industry's optimism in increasing its capacity is being rewarded by a good volume of business that shows signs of increasing. Steel magazine says Sunday.

Through 1954 United States steel mills increased their total capacity to make ingots and castings by 1,497,000 net tons to a record of 125,823,310 tons.

To support this steel-making potential, the industry boosted its blast furnace capacity 1,969,710 net tons to \$3,971,100 tons.

Last week the ingot production rate rose 3.5 points to 82.5 per cent of the 1954 capacity rating or 80.5 per cent of the new capacity rating.

The quickened pace of domestic steel production, along with export demand for scrap, pushed Steel magazine's composite price on steel-making grades of scrap to \$34.50 a gross ton from \$32.83 in the preceding week. The magazine's composite price on finished steel remains at \$117.96 a net ton.

## Building Kitty From Seized Lottery Funds

**OTTAWA (CP)**—Ottawa is building up a sizeable kitty in seized lottery funds and police said Thursday. Most comes from Vancouver, Winnipeg and other western centres. Vancouver is the biggest contributor.

Ottawa police have been seizing lottery tickets and receipts for more than a year by taking advantage of a Criminal Code section permitting their seizure "wherever found." Armed with a search warrant police board railway express cars as they pass through Ottawa from the west in the weeks sweepstakes are drawn.

Police morality officers say many of the bundles seized contain money orders and cheques in payment for tickets. These the city cashes by the simple method of having them signed by a magistrate.

Mayor Charlotte Whitton has mentioned \$20,000 in seized lottery funds and suggested it might be used by the city to encourage the theatre, ballet, art and other cultural endeavors. But other sources say the total seized by Ottawa police is much more than that—possibly \$50,000.
