MR. A. A. McLEAN NOMINATED

As the Liberal-Conservative Candidate For Belfast.

The greatest enthusiasm prevailed at the Liberal-Conservative convention at Eldon, Belfast, on Saturday afternoon. The convention was a thoroughly representative one, every polling division being represented. Reports highly favorable to the Conservative party were received from each polling division.

Upon motion of Hon. James Nicholson, seconded by Mr. D. D. McLeod, Mr. A. A. McLean was unanimously nominated as the Liberal-Conservative candidate at the ensuing election.

Mr. McLean, in acknowledging the honor done him, spoke at some length, reviewing the present deplorable condition of the province, - a condition brought about by the mismanagement and incompetency of the Liberals.

He pointed out that the Liberals seemed utterly powerless to lift the province out of the financial slough in which they had placed it.

The meeting was also addressed by Mr. Alexander Martin, M. P., and others. The addresses were all attentively listened to and generously applauded.

The prospects for Mr. McLean's election are excellent.

After singing the National Anthem and cheering for Mr. Martin and the candidate the meeting adjourned.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. Henry Wood, Mr. F. B. McRae acted as secretary.

MISS DE PRAZER - Last evening in the Baptist Church, Miss De Prazer, M. D., delivered an address on missionary work in India. Dr. Prazer is a native of India and had been trained in its heathenism. While speaking she was attired in native costume and spoke for an hour in the most delightful manner. She said it was through the preaching of a maritime missionary that she was converted to Christianity about sixteen years ago, and she decided to practice medicine among her own sex as the best means of christianizing in India. The great difficulty was overcoming caste. She appealed to Christians to aid the missionary work carried on in benighted India. On Saturday afternoon Dr. De Prazer also spoke in the Baptist school-room, and gave a most interesting address.

DEWEY'S TRIUMPH - The hero of Manila is overwhelmed by the splendour of his New York reception. He viewed the big water parade from the deck of the Olympia. Three million people witnessed the pageant from the shore, while a quarter of a million more were afloat.

SECOND CROP RASPBERRIES - We were given today two raspberry canes, cut in the garden of W. E. Dawson, Esq., on which were quite a number of large, ripe berries as well as many others that had not quite fully developed. The berries were of delicious flavor, and borne so plentifully on the stalk as to give promise of a large second crop.

THE BRANT - The Dominion steamer Brant left this morning for Summerside, and will take the members for East and West Prince with some of their Liberal friends and supporters to Cape Tormentine to investigate a winter mail route. She will also supply the remaining light-houses and mark some buoys in Summerside harbor. The Brant will then return to Charlottetown and be turned over to the fisheries protection service and Admiral Hotkirik.

A FATAL ACCIDENT - On Saturday the 21st Sept. Mr. Jas. J. McDonald, of Montello, Wisconsin, was almost instantly killed by a runaway horse. He was driving in a heavy wagon when the horse took fright and bolted. Mr. McDonald lost control of the horse, and the animal dashed across a railway track throwing him out of the wagon. The heavy wheels struck his head with such force that it was crushed in, and he died without speaking a word. Mr. McDonald was born in Scotland in 1825 and emigrated to Nova Scotia when a young man and from there he came to P. E. Island. In 1849 he removed to Illinois, and in 1851 went to Wisconsin. He had lived in Montello about 16 years being engaged in the lumber business about 2 years ago. In 1883 he married Catherine McDonald, of Charlottetown, who with five children survive him. She is a sister of Mrs. J. J. McKenna, of Charlottetown. The Montello papers say that Mr. McDonald was an industrious man and by careful management accumulated considerable property. He was an honest and upright man in his dealings with others and lived a straightforward life.
