BULLETINS FROM BIRDLAND GAUDY MOTHERS

So accustomed are we to bright coloured males and dull females in Birdland that we are surprised to learn of exceptions to this rule. The next time a stately-blue Belted Kingfisher goes a stately-blue note whether or not it wears chestnut on its sides and across its underparts just a little below the grey-blue band. This extra colour belongs to the female. Why? We can only guess. Nature devised the plan of sombre looking mother birds because they are the parents that care for the nestlings, and enemies must not be attracted by a gay appearance. But the home of a Kingfisher is at the end of a tunnel made in What colour is earth generally? Reddish brown, somewhat the colour of Mrs. Kingfisher's extra markings. So perhaps we understand why she is a gaudy mother.

For a very different reason, the three species of Phalarope—Red, Northern, and Wilson's—have this peculiar, reversed colouring of the sexes. All father Phalaropes do the household chores, as building the nest and incubating. Consequently they are smaller than their wives, and more demurely dressed. The female Red Phalarope in her spring costume is particularly gaudy looking; her red is more vivid than her husband's, her white face patch larger and with a more defined outline than his. Mrs. Northern Phalarope's bib is red, his is fawn colour, flecked with white, grey, or brown. The female of the third species is richly and uniquely marked, with large black and red stripes on neck and sides, where he simply has a pale chestnut wash.

Contrary to the habit of most birds, these females arrive first at the breeding grounds. There they await the coming of the males when they act boldly, carry on with what is known as "display flights", and give special calls to attract a mate. However, they readily aid their partners somewhat in caring for their downy young until they are able to get to a nearby pond. After the summer moult, the two sexes cannot be told apart—both are plainly garbed.
