

# 18 Horses May Get Word In Kentucky's Big Classic

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The name horses, Tim Tam and Jewel's Reward, have a grudge settled Saturday in the \$125,000 Kentucky Derby, but different riders will be aboard the lightly-regarded colts in the three-year-old classic.

They'll have to reckon with Billy Sullivan, California's thrilling two-stage rocket, and a gang of others in the 84th running of the mile- and a-quarter gallop. The latest barn count showed 17 still being considered as starters, but with a probable lineup of about 15.

However, many observers are confident Calumet Farm's Tim Tam and Maine Chance Farm's Jewel's Reward will be the two favorites as they were in the opening at Hialeah March 1.

On that afternoon jockey Manuel Ycaza whipped Jewel's Reward furiously down the stretch and the colt played bumpsadisy

with Tim Tam for better than an eighth of a mile.

**CALLS FOUL**  
Bill Hartack, aboard Tim Tam, claimed foul against Ycaza and the stewards disqualified Mrs. Elizabeth N. Graham's colt in favor of Mrs. Gene Markey's horse. Instead of \$97,800, Mrs. Graham got only \$20,000 for second place and Ycaza was given a 15-day suspension.

As far as the riders are concerned, things will be changed at 5:20 p.m. EDT Saturday when the Derby field parades to the post for the start 10 minutes later.

Ycaza was taken off Jewel's Reward April 14 and replaced by Eddie Arcaro, the master who has accounted for a record five Derbies.

Hartack, who won last year's Derby for Calumet aboard Iron Liege, landed in a hospital with a broken leg last Saturday after a starting gate accident at Churchill Downs. Ismael Valen-

zuela will handle Tim Tam Saturday.

**TRACK DRYING**  
There was little change in the Derby picture, although the sun shone brightly for the first time since last Friday, helping dry out the muddy racing strip. Several trainers and owners have said their horses will go only if the track is fast.

Silky Sullivan, owned by Phil Klipstein and Tom Ross, isn't particular about the going—wet or dry—says trainer Reggie Cornell. "He doesn't have to carry his racetrack around with him."

Tim Tam proved he could handle an off-track in winning the Derby Trail Stakes. Ivan Parke, who conditions Jewel's Reward, said the top ace in his three-horse entry "could run over a tin roof."

**Austrian Boxer Has Hopes For Crack At Title**  
TORONTO (CP) — A hulking Austrian heavyweight and his fast-talking manager take off today for Vancouver to tackle Archie Moore and step—they hope—to a crack at the Canadian heavy title.

Kurt Scheigl, 32-years-old, six-foot-two and 212 pounds, will take on the aging light-heavyweight champion of the world in the Vancouver Forum May 9 in a non-title bout.

The prospects? "It looks pretty good. He's a good rough boy and I've been training him up for the last seven months," says manager Jimmy Jones, former hand of Canadian champ Earl Walls.

After the Moore bout, Jones has his eye on the vacant Canadian heavyweight title.

"We're shooting for George Chuvalo, but if the commission wants it, we'll fight (James J.) Parker first and the winner can go after Chuvalo."

**Dodger Fans Are Many**  
LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Los Angeles Dodgers went into their 11th game at home Wednesday needing only 2,621 fans on hand to hit a fat 400,000 figure for the new season.

Last year in Brooklyn, the mark — 406,443 — came in the Dodgers' 28th home appearance.

President Walter O'Malley, viewing the attendance figures, declared: "I'm amazed and pleased. If anyone had told me we could get clobbered 15-2 one day and have over 60,000 the following night, I would not have believed it."

He referred to the series with St. Louis Cardinals last week.

Ramsay's enthusiastic supporters know he can give but they wonder if he can receive. The Alberton-born puncher throws plenty of leather but little is known whether or not he can take a stiff smash and still stay in there. He's sure to learn the answer May 9 when he opposes Steele, for the "Tiger" sure can hit. He can work inside and get under Ramsay's arms, which has led to the downfall of every guy he's faced. Steele knows all the tricks.

Promoter Charlie Hogan considers himself fortunate in matching Steele and Ramsay for Summerside bout. The pair met before and Steele won. Promoter Hogan states that Ramsay has been after a return bout for some time and he expects the match to be one of the best he has presented in some years.

Both have good records. The former Charlottetown ringman is one of his best years in 1957. Steele in his conquests was a decision against highly-

rated Tony Veronis of Boston, and a good win over Doug Odo. Ramsay has a long and successful record which includes triumphs over such well known boxers as Leroy Jones, Jimmie O'Malley, Johnny Griffith, Gordon Walsh, Bobby Donovan, Lloyd Carr and others. **High Praise For Juniors**  
OTTAWA (CP)—Al Paradise, referee of the Memorial Cup hockey final, thinks Regina Pats and Ottawa-Hull Canadiens are the best behaved bunch of youngsters he's seen.

"They're not giving me any trouble," said the 26-year-old Winnipegger who doesn't look much older than the boys competing for the Canadian junior championship.

But lest the players be encouraged by this to try some funny business, Al's record in the Western Hockey League shows he can be tough.

He joined the WHL's staff of full-time referees last autumn and after a swing on the Prairies, "where I was respected," he made his first trip to the Pacific Coast.

"The boys murdered me everywhere," he said.

### Queen's Colt Wins Race

NEWMARKET, England (Reuters) — A 20-to-1 shot carrying the purple and scarlet silks of the royal stable Wednesday won the classic of Britain's horse racing season.

Challenging strongly in the final two furlongs, the Queen's colt Pall Mall captured the 2,000 Guineas by half a length in the pace-setting Major Port.

Bald Eagle, favorite at 7 to 1, finished seventh in the field of three-year-olds.

Time for the mile race on the level and down turf course was 1:24.4.

A photo gave third place to the English colt Nagami over the French-bred Val d'Oisans.

It was the fifth victory this year for the Queen, British money-winner on the leading turf season. Pall Mall's win was worth £13,917.

Well out of it in the early running, Pall Mall closed strongly and caught up to Major Port in the 1½ furlongs to go.

For the Queen, this was her second victory in a classic but she was unable to see in person. She has been indisposed all week with a cold. Her other classic victory came last year when Carza captured the Oaks.
