The gospel tells the love of the Saviour which must win men if any love will.

We were asked if this was the highest priced horse ever sold in the Maritimes and our answer is, no. Bill Sharen 2:11 1/2, a 5-year-old by Captain Aubrey 2:07 1/2, bred by a Mr. Boyle in Moncton and given that record by Bill Sharen, won the Free For All Trot at Charlottetown, October 1, 1920, won the Free For All Trot at Woodstock the following week, best time 2:11 1/2, which was the trotting record for Maritime tracks that were then very heavy and unlike those of today. Two days afterwards she lost the first heat of the free for all trot to Silk Girl in 2:09, which was a new track record, and then went on to win the next two and race. She also won at Fredericton and Halifax. Her breeding is of the best. One of her grand-sires was a world's champion and her pedigree is teeming with speed. We trust Syd will give the best of success with John D.

In the Charlottetown papers has appeared particulars of the sale of the 5-year-old trotter Dean Galton 2:08 1/2, owned by Earl Sample, Summerside, recorded in Maine this fall to a party for \$20,000, by far the highest price ever realized for a Prince Edward Island owned horse. The sale was negotiated by Dr. F. C. Dougan and it is expected that the buyer's name and other particulars will soon be available. We congratulate Earl Sample on having developed this colt from a 2-year-old to his present condition and the fact that he stepped a mile in 2:04 1/2 timed by several parties at Charlottetown track some months ago. We were asked if this was the highest priced horse ever sold in the Maritimes and our answer is, no. Bill Sharen 2:11 1/2, a 5-year-old by Captain Aubrey 2:07 1/2, bred by a Mr. Boyle in Moncton and given that record by Bill Sharen, won the Free For All Trot at Charlottetown, October 1, 1920, won the Free For All Trot at Woodstock the following week, best time 2:11 1/2, which was the trotting record for Maritime tracks that were then very heavy and unlike those of today. In the last event he met the best pacers in Maine and the Maritimes and made monkeys of them. That led to his sale by his owner, Howard Murchie of Milltown, N. B. to Thomas W. Murphy for \$25,000 in American money, equal to \$27,500 in Canadian funds. He raced on the Grand Circuit for Murphy, but had to take second place in nearly all the stakes to Peter the Brewer 2:02 1/2. His final record was 2:04 1/2.
