MALDEN, MASS. — Linton W. Silliker, 63, for many years a leader in veteran's activities in Malden and Middlesex County died Saturday at his home 549 Pleasant Street, Malden, Massachusetts. He was born and always resided in Malden.

For many years he was a Social Investigator for the Malden Welfare Department, and had retired a few years ago because of his health.

He was adjutant of Malden Post American Legion for a number of years. He was one of the three original appointees to the Welfare Department of Investigators, and with Welfare Agent James F. Mahar, and former investigator John H. Aston, was appointed in November, 1932. He retired in February 1956.

He served as a member of the old Malden Common Council for three terms, 1925, 1926 and 1927. He was business manager of the old Malden Drum and Bugle Corps, and was a member of the First Congregational Church. He leaves two sisters, Mrs. Wendell D. (Lillian B.) Nourse, 89 Cherry Street, and Mrs. Harry A. (Esther L.) McCumber of 540 Pleasant Street. Services were held at the Weir Funeral Home 144 Salem Street, Wednesday at 2 p.m. and he was buried with full military honors at Forest Dale Cemetery.

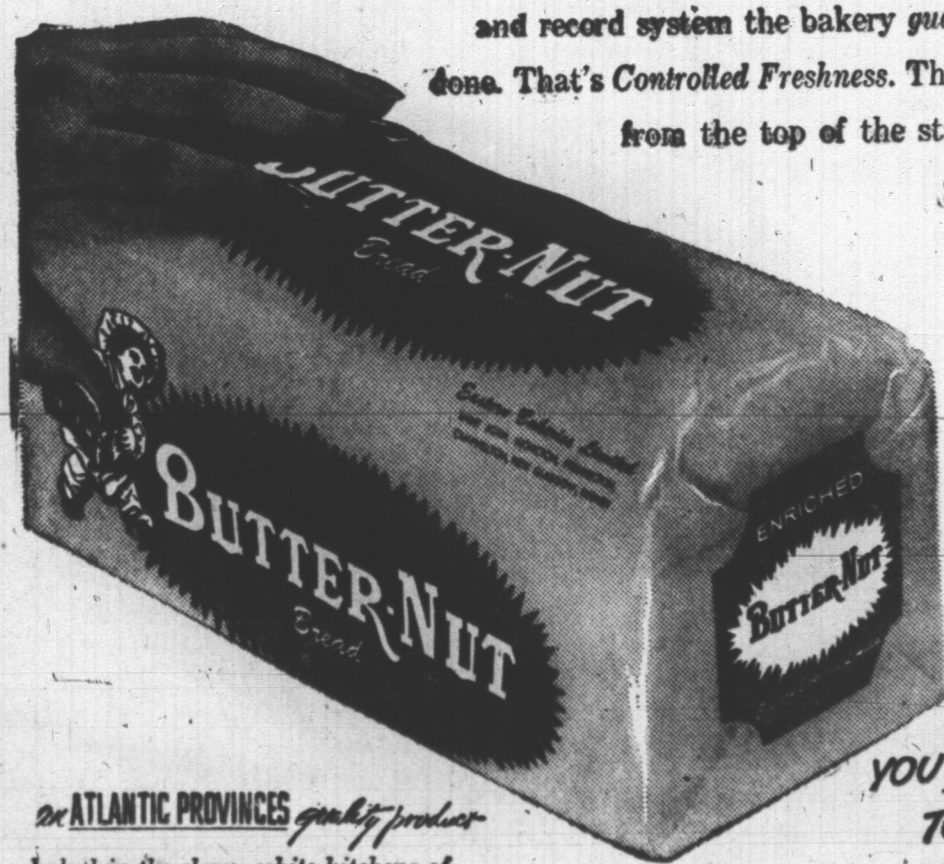

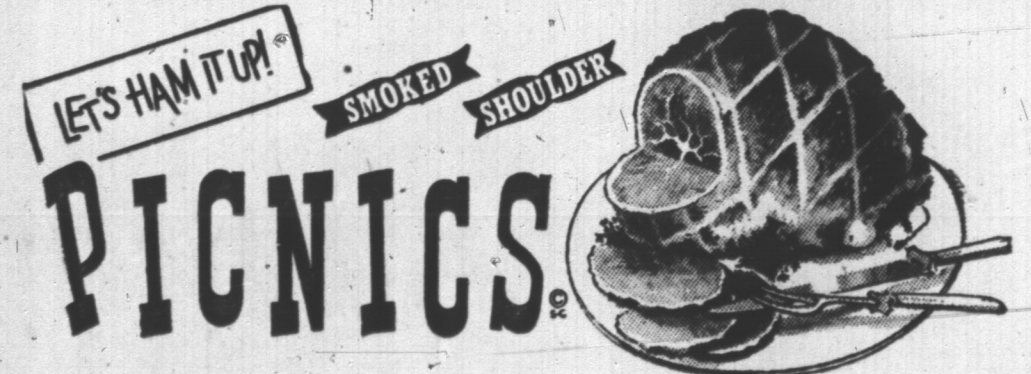
