# Colt Stakes Are Staged At Local Driving Park

The harness-racing Stars of tomorrow competed before the public in the Colt Stakes at the local driving park yesterday afternoon. A large crowd of harness-racing enthusiasts turned out to see these youngsters perform on this warm, sunny Labor Day.

There were four double dash winners on the program. Winners of each event were presented with trophies. Coolers were also presented by the P. E.I. Harness Racing Club, the presentations being made by Jack Annear, president of the Club.

Hollybud, a 2-year-old bay gelding, owned and driven by C.L. Poley of Richmond, Quebec, captured both dashes of the two year old pace.

Mrs. Doug Hill presented Mr. Poley with the Rendezvous trophy along with the cooler, presented by the Racing Club.

Mary Leah won both heats of the Colonel D.A. MacKinnon 4-year-old trot. The brown mare, owned by Leigh O'Brien of Eimsdale, dusted the oval in 2:21 and 2:30. Immediately following her second victory, the owner, Mr. O'Brien was presented with the Col. D.A. MacKinnon trophy, by Col. "Dan" himself, and also received a cooler.

Brewer's Pride, another main-land entry, captured both dashes of the Willard Kelly Memorial Trot for 2-year-olds. The chestnut gelding, owned by E.M. Johnston of Great Village, Nova Scotia, trotted miles of 2:35.2 and 2:32.3. The Willard Kelly Memorial trophy presented by Mrs. Horace Willis and the cooler went to Mr. Johnston.

The other double dash winner was Morley's Pride, a three-year-old bay gelding, owned by Jack Annear of Montague. The youngster captured both dashes of the J.R. Williams Memorial Pace for 3-year-olds and the trophy emblematic of this event, and the cooler.

The gelding, piloted by Ralph Annear, dusted the oval in identical times of 2:17, the fastest miles on the program.

Emba and Carl Watchim shared honors in the E.F. Acorn Trot for 3-year-olds but Emba captured both the trophy and the cooler, by virtue of his faster mile. 2:24. Carl Watchim's mile was 2:25-2. Emba is owned by George Callback of Summerside.

The highest pay of the day was the first daily double, \$25, on a combination ticket of Brewer's Pride and Mary Leah. The second double on the 7th

and 10th dashes, returned a mere \$4.70. The quinella paid \$3.30 and the exactor, \$10.50. The highest single pay was a show ticket on Lady Hilda Clegg in the 5th race which returned \$8.30. A win ticket on Jimmy Gallon in the ninth dash paid \$8. Mary Leah was barred from the betting in this race.
