Whether you view her in regard to her fisheries, in regard to her timber, in regard to her minerals, in regard to her soil, in regard to her climate, you cannot find a country or a people occupying a prouder, a more advantageous, or a more splendid position.

She has the glory of British institutions; she offers a security for life and property not exceeded by any institution that human skill or sagacity has yet devised.

No foreign foe can touch her soil; the unrivalled navies of England are evidence to the outlying portions of the Empire of their complete security and immunity from aggression.

With all these advantages we have perfect independence under the British flag.

We have indeed the fact that we are a part of that great Empire under whose aegis human rights and political liberty are secure.

Under these circumstances, where is the man who will say that Canada in this hour of prosperity should shrink for one single moment from the duty imposed upon her by the grandeur of our position of standing by that great Empire, which gives us so much—and absolutely for nothing?

Where is the man who would ask that an additional penny be charged against the people of the British Isles for the maintenance of the forces sent to aid the Mother Country in her necessity?—Sir Charles Tapper.

ONLY ONE POINT.

THE MILK COMPETITION.

SIR,—I notice in last week's EXAMINER a writer signing himself "Truth," who claims that D. P. Irving holds the distinction of being the largest patron of any factory on the Island. SUPREME COURT

TUESDAY, Feb. 20.

George F. Robinson vs. The British America Assurance Company. Trial Term last when verdict was rendered for the plaintiff for \$2,960. A rule for nonsuit or new trial was argued, Michaelmas Term last, when judgment was reserved. The Chief Justice today delivered judgment holding that the verdict of the jury must be set aside and a nonsuit entered. Mr. Justice Hodgson and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald concurred. Ronald McMillan vs. the City of Charlottetown. Action of damages for alleged neglect or refusal on the part of the firemen of the city to extinguish a fire on the premises of the plaintiff. The defendant city demurred to the plaintiff's declaration, contending that the city was not liable for the acts of its firemen in performance of their duty as firemen. The demurrer came on for argument in Michaelmas Term last when judgment was reserved. The Chief Justice today delivered judgment overruling the demurrer with costs—holding that the city is liable for neglect on the part of its firemen. While they are in the discharge of their duty. Mr. Justice Hodgson and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald concurred.

Judgment in other cases pending will be given this afternoon.
