(Federation of Agriculture News)

T. EATON CO. SCHOLARSHIP

The attention of high school students—those who have completed Grade 12, or will complete it by next spring—is drawn to the fact that the T. Eaton Company annually offers a scholarship providing for attendance at the degree course of any Agricultural College in Canada. Each province is entitled to name one applicant for the scholarship. The applicant is provided with an all expense trip to the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto where the final examination and decision is given.

Any male high school students with ambitions to pursue a career in scientific agriculture should immediately contact the Provincial Department of Agriculture for information and application forms.

FEDERATION ACTIVITIES

For the information of farmers who may not be fully aware of the work done on their behalf by the Federation of Agriculture, we draw to the attention of the public a number of the more important matters which the Federation has been able to achieve.

WARTIME PROGRAMS

Federation activity brought recognition to the fact that wartime price control had frozen farm prices at almost depression levels. Result—fairer farm price arrangements and subsidies which made it possible for Canadian farmers to maintain needed wartime food production at record levels, under wartime regulations.

WARTIME FOOD BOARD

Federation activity brought formation of the Canadian Food Board, with advisory committee headed by Federation president, and with the Federation having a hand in negotiating wartime food contracts.

WAR ASSETS DISPOSAL

The Federation was the only national organization given the privilege of representing by a staff member in headquarters of the War Assets Corporation, assuring farmers a fair share of distribution of such war assets, as tractors and trucks.

PRICES SUPPORT ACT

The Federation took a leading part in securing passage of the post-war prices support act, with representation on the advisory committee headed by Federation president. (Present representation ten members).

MARKETING ACT

Federation persistence won the passage of the Federal Marketing Act of 1949, later challenged and upheld by the highest court of appeal.

INCOME TAX

Constant effort and negotiation by the Federation over a period of years brought about a complete revamping of income tax regulations, removing injustices and inequities in application of regulations to farming, and winning establishment of the basic herd system, the averaging of farm income and other needed changes.

FREIGHT ASSISTANCES

Policy on freight assistance for coarse grain shipments to eastern provinces and B. C. from west, established in 1939 largely as a result of Federation activity, bringing immense savings to livestock feeders and undoubtedly expanded markets to prairie grain growers.

REPRESENTATION

Federation representation is granted on many public bodies,

such as the National Employment Commission advisory committee; the National Manpower Council; the National Agricultural Advisory Committee; the International Labour Organization Agricultural Committee and many others.

PRESENTATIONS

One of the Federation's greatest activities, and one which has won it immense prestige, is the presentation of briefs on behalf of Canadian farming industry to such bodies as the Transport Board, Parliamentary committees, Senate Committees, Canadian Tariff Board, Royal Commissions etc. Over 50 briefs have been presented in past twelve years.

INTERNATIONAL F.A.O.

Since the formation of the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations, the Federation President has been an advisory member of the Canadian delegation to the annual conferences.

In these, and in many other ways, the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, the Provincial Federations of Agriculture, and the other member bodies in nine provinces, are on the job every day, year in and year out, serving the producer interests and dealing with the thousand and one problems of the farmer which come to their doorstep throughout the year. As Editor of the *Bowmanville Ont.*, "Statesman" said recently in a headline: "The Federation has been a life-saver for the farmers."

Farmers who are interested in the future of Agriculture might do well to consider whether their support of the Federation has been sufficiently strong and active to ensure its continuing maximum efforts in the future on their behalf. The Federation throws out a lifeline to farmers, will we grasp it or let it float away, leaving us to founder in the stormy sea of disension and ineffective individual fault finding.

WESTERN FARM TROUBLES

For the most part the troubles of Western Canada have been highlighted by stories of drought and dust storms and associated crop failures.

The present year has seen a complete reversal with the trouble coming from excess moisture, land too wet for cultivation and a serious outbreak of rust and difficult harvesting conditions. On top of these difficulties, early frost damaged the immature grain and what has been fit to cut has been sprouting in the swath.

The story of 1954 for the western farmer will be that of a small crop of low quality grain, the market price of which, will, to a certain extent, be governed by the accumulated surpluses of past years.
