## GREAT BATTLE AT SANTIAGO.

THE NAVY WAITING FOR THE MILITARY EXPEDITION.

After Santiago is taken Porto Rico to be Attacked.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—A great battle at Santiago will occur on Friday, at which time the U. S. troops will reach the city, according to Secretary of War Alger.

In the meantime the navy will wait for the military expedition to take up a position.

Santiago will according to present plans be occupied by the American army first and Porto Rico will be invaded later.

It says that auxiliaries were painted to represent cruisers which have really gone to the Philippines.

IS WAITING FOR THE TROOPS TO ARRIVE.

And Helping the Insurgents in the Meantime.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—News was received from Dewey yesterday to the effect that his plans at Manila are working out admirably.

He has succeeded in placing upon the insurgents modern methods of conducting military operations against the Spaniards, while he is awaiting the arrival of troops.

The monitor Monadnock, now at Mare Island, California, has been ordered to sail for Manila within ten days.

## TROOPS LANDED AT SANTIAGO.

With Heavy Seige Guns.

SAID TO HAVE LANDED LAST SATURDAY.

Engineers, Artillery and Infantry were Disembarked,

NEW YORK, June 7.—The ticker service at 2.25 yesterday sent out the following from Mole, St. Nicholas: The United States cruiser St. Louis arrived here this morning with despatches from Washington.

She brought news that troops were successfully landed west of Santiago de Cuba on Saturday.

The troops were one battalion of engineers, three batteries of artillery, three regiments of infantry.

A number of heavy seige guns were also easily disembarked by the use of pontoons.

## THE MONTREAL HARBOR WORKS

Discussed in Parliament.

FOSTER ATTACKS THE POLICY OF MR. TARTE.

Who Says He Represents the People of Canada.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, June 7.—In reply to a question by McDougall, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said he would refuse to discuss a private and confidential communication.

This refers to Laurier's letter to Cardinal Rampollo asking for the appointment of an accredited papal delegate in Canada.

In the discussion of the Montreal harbor, bill Foster called attention to the action of Tarte in compelling the Montreal Harbor Board to accept his plans for improvements.

He was forcing on the people of Montreal, as a condition of the loan, a costly series of harbour works which men and business organizations of that city were opposed to and which are not now needed by the public.

Tarte had said he had no financial interest, but he could not deny that there was a strong speculative interest in the construction of these works at Montreal east, and that these interests were lobbying and wire-pulling in favor of this scheme.

Tarte replied warmly, handling the Montreal business men without gloves.

Tarte declared that he represented the people of Canada and proposed to rescue the trade of Montreal from the dominion of selfish parties.
