Four Accidents Keep Police Busy

A rash of car collisions kept Charlottetown's police force on the top yesterday. The first occurred approximately 10:30 a.m. and was followed by three others later in the day. All four involved passenger vehicles.

Most serious of the four accidents occurred on Upper Prince Street at approximately 7:15 p.m. and resulted in the removal to hospital of Mary Bertha McIsaac, nine-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leo P. McIsaac, Mermaid.

At 10:30 a.m. a car turning left from the provincial building driveway came into collision with another vehicle proceeding east on Richmond Street. At 8:10 a car proceeding south on Malpeque Road and a car coming north and turning off into the owner's driveway were in collision, while slightly earlier two cars were involved in a collision at the Cumberland-Fitzroy intersection.

Police estimates indicated that damage in the first of the latter three cases would amount to more than \$100, while the final accident's toll was between \$50 and \$100. None of the parties involved in either of these latter three accidents were injured.

Mermaid Girl Struck By Car

Mary Bertha McIsaac, nine-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leo P. McIsaac, Mermaid, was rushed to the Charlottetown Hospital by ambulance last evening following an accident on Upper Prince Street.

Description of the young girl's injuries was unavailable at press time last night, but early reports indicated that they were fairly extensive.

City police said that the accident occurred at approximately 7:15 p.m. when the girl stepped out of the door on the left side of a car just parked by the driver, her mother, into the path of an 1959 Austin travelling south.

Driver of the Austin police said was John E. Davis of North River. The accident occurred almost immediately in front of 49 Upper Prince.

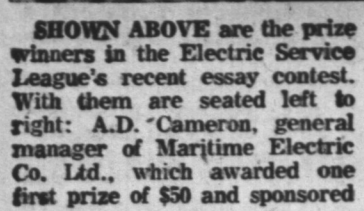

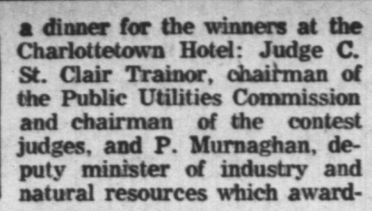

He spoke of the fact that the interest is to be paid in United States currency "and at the present rate of exchange we need only about \$95 to pay \$100 in interest."

Mr. McQuaid also remarked on the provision for a sinking fund investment of three per cent each year and said the province had reserved the privilege of spending this annual amount of \$120,000 to the United States and retiring bonds to that amount. This practice, he stated, would mean an annual saving of \$6,000 at a five per cent exchange rate.

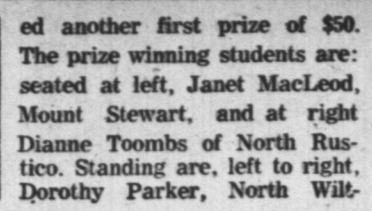
The meeting was convened with a prayer by Rev. R. S. Laiter invoking God's blessing on this new venture of faith.

Mrs. Warren was rushed to hospital by ambulance Saturday after an accident at her home at 285 Granville Street, in which she was badly burned.

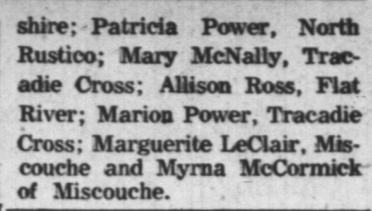

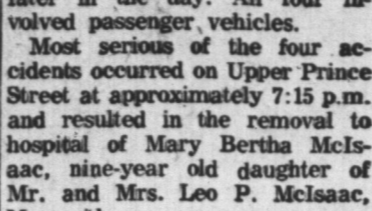
