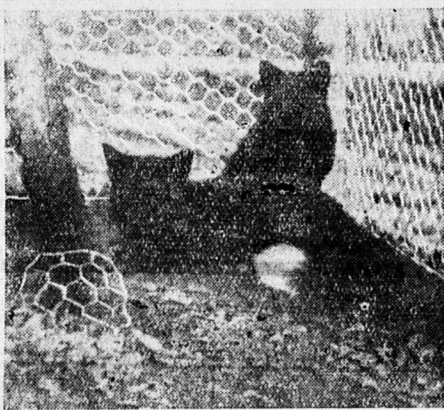

## WELTHIEST CITIZEN OF BELGIUM PASSES

BRUSSELS, May 30.—Ernest Solvay, the inventor, reputed to be Belgium's richest man, died suddenly this morning.

M Solvay recently celebrated his 84th birthday, and was frequently styled "The Carnegie of Belgium". His prominence in invention and industry came from his originating the Solvay process for the manufacture of soda.

During the war he took a prominent part in Belgium relief work, and so embittered the Germans that on one occasion he was sentenced to three months imprisonment for insulting a German officer.

# COST OF COAL GIVEN

OTTAWA, Ont., May 30.—The Canadian Government Railways management purchased 14,963 tons of coal from United States in February, 9,493 tons in March and 11,457 tons in April at a purchase transportation cost of \$4.76 per ton. This coal cost \$1.95 per ton at the mine while the railway and ferry rate from Coburg, Ontario costs 2.81. This information was given Mr. George B. From This Number the Special Committee Has Recommended Seven to the Grand Lodge—Pictou I. O. O. F. Strong for Selection of "Norway House."

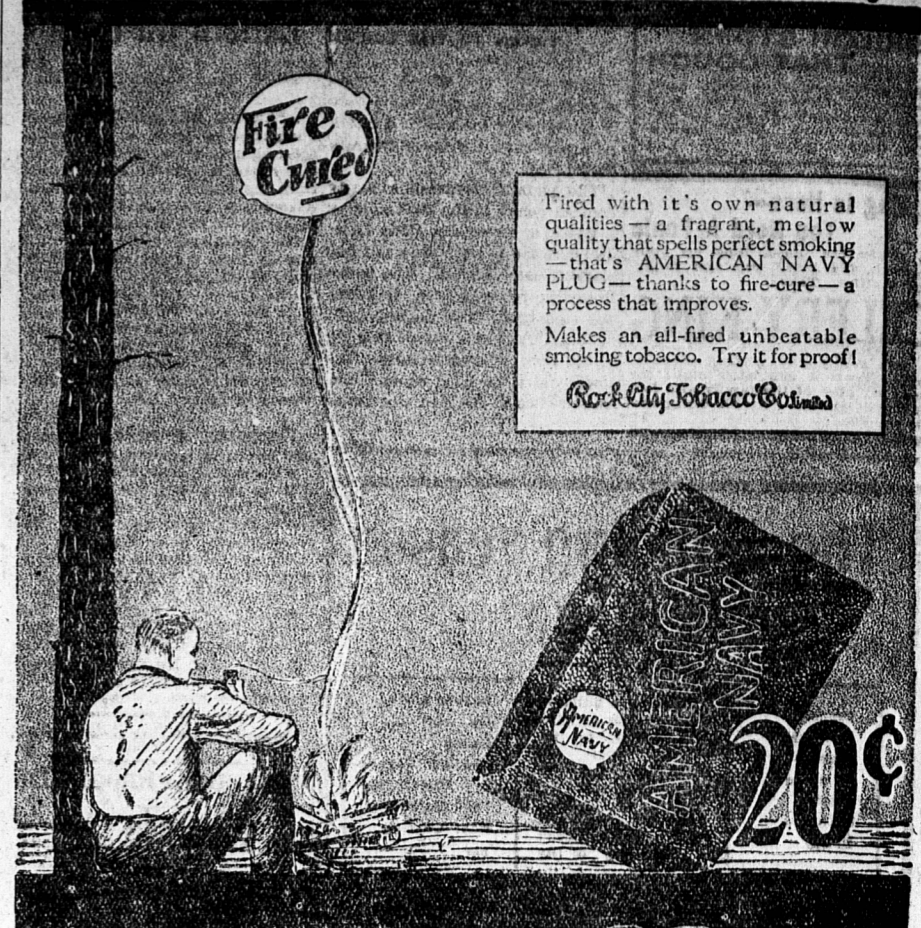

F. are out strong in favor of selection of the Norway Home property of the late Lord Strathcona at Pictou, as the location of the new Home. There are in Pictou County 11 subordinate lodges of the I. 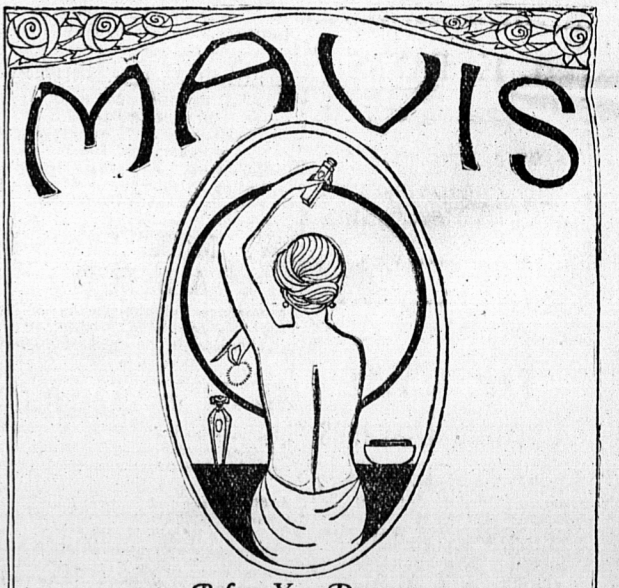
