GENERAL GASCOIGNE'S EX- PLANATION.

Did Not Intend to Reflect on Officers of the 66th.

Holds to His Order Respecting Army Reserve Men.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—The Minister of
Militia was asked yesterday for a state-
ment in reference to the difficulty between
General Gascoigne and the officers of the
66th Regiment Dr. Borden said: "The
General disavows any intention of reflecting
on the conduct of the officers of the 66th,
or to wound either their honor or dignity.
He regrets that such a construction should
have been placed upon anything he said.
He has pointed out that his object was to
put a stop to the practice of army reserve
men enlisting in the militia and that he
was alluding to the men rather than to the
officers. The General does not with-
draw at all from his previously expressed
order against the enlistment of army
reserve men. The minister added that he
was in hopes that the explanation,
which would be communicated to Colonel
Irving for transmission to the officers of
the 66th, would be satisfactory to all the
parties concerned.

TURKEY AND RUSSIA.

An Outrage in the Streets of Volo.

Attack on the Secretary of Russian Embassy.

ATHENS, Dec. 2.—The Secretary of the
Russian Embassy, at Constantinople was
attacked yesterday by beggars at Volo,
the principal port of Thessaly.

The Turkish military patrol that was
passing joined the beggars in the attack
and Mr. Tscherbatachoff was knocked
down by one of his assailants. He was
badly battered with rifle and eventually
bound with cords. The English, French
and Italian members of the committee for
the repatriation of Thessalian refugees,
arrived on the scene at this point and after
much talk succeeded in getting the cords
cut.

The incident has stirred up the diplom-
atists and is likely to stiffen Russia in her
dealings with Turkey.

A Girl Badly Burned.

AMHERST, N. S., Dec. 2.—The eight
year old daughter of Mr. W. Bugley was
badly burned yesterday that she is
expected to die.

AT MONCTON.

Liberal Committee Threatens to Disband.

MONCTON, Dec. 2.—The greatest dissat-
isfaction prevails among the Liberals here,
especially with Hon. Mr. Blair's manage-
ment of the Intercolonial Railway; and a
meeting of the Liberal committee was
held on Monday. The meeting was, it
transpires, called especially to consider
the advisability of disbanding.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Advices received
to-day reported that a herd of reindeer
with supplies had been started from a
point on the lower Yukon, about 600
miles from above St. Michaels, the herd
reaching the place by cutting across land
from a point opposite on the coast. These
reindeers are carrying supplies up and a
number of the people anxious to get down
from the Klondike country will be brought
back by this means.

MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—The Star's special
correspondent in London cables. While
Fielding was in London, Lord Farrer
sought a conference with him on the ten-
dencies of the Canadian policy. The
result is seen in the Cobden club report
today, wherein it is stated that he is sat-
isfied that the Canadian government has
expressed a genuine desire to advance on
the lines of free exchange as far as possi-
ble and consistent with a prudent regard
of difficulties created by the long rule of
the comprehensive protective system.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Sugar-beet growing
has received a decided impetus in the
report of the success of this season's crop in
Essex and Suffolk, where a revival of the
erstwhile flourishing industry has been
tentatively tried with the most encourag-
ing results. Already a factory at Green-
ock has been reopened for the handling
of the produce of the experimental plant-
ings. An analysis of the root shows it to
contain 14.01 per cent. of saccharine, a
gain of 13.97 in Germany, while the Eng-
lish crop weighs over 16 tons per acre,
against Germany's average of 13 tons per
acre.

MALDEN, N. Y., Nov. 30.—Old, experi-
enced A. road-trappers predict a long
cold winter. They say the wild animals,
deer particularly, have especially thick
coats this year and that the muskrats are
building big and thick walls, signs which
they declare have never failed.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Eight barges loaded
with cases of gunpowder falsely labelled
"arms" have been seized by the customs
officers in the Thames. They emanated
from Russia and were about to be trans-
ferred to the steamer Baluchistan for
Persia. It is suggested that the ammuni-
tion was destined for the Atrides.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—The task of
getting supplies to the Klondike in win-
ter is underestimated, and doubts are
entertained as to its being a possibility. It
is believed that an expedition cannot reach
the Klondike before April at the earliest,
and the hope is expressed that there is a
sufficient supply of food to last until that
time. It is estimated that there are 6,000
people in the gold country. Secretary
Alger believes that Captain Ray has gone
to Dawson, and that he will make his
way back and report upon conditions
there. Nothing has been heard from him
since he left for the Yukon, but the secre-
tary expects advices from him soon. It
is believed the president will send a special
message to congress asking for appropria-
tion for the relief of the people in the
Klondike, and it is believed that prompt
action will be taken and the money made
immediately available.

NEW YORK, November 30.—Dr. Biggs of
the board of health, made some startling
statements before the board of estimates,
while that body was today considering the
city budget for 1898. The board of esti-
mates was asked to approve a grant of \$60,
000 for the care of tuberculosis in a special
hospital. Dr. Biggs, speaking for the board
of health in support of the appropriation,
declared that one out of every seven per-
sons who die in this city are victims of
tubercular consumption. Dr. Biggs further
stated that among the working classes
the percentage of deaths due to this dis-
ease was one quarter.

LETON, Dec. 1.—The morning papers
asserts that China has agreed to cede to
England a strip of territory near Hong
Kong and all the surrounding islands, in
order to enable England to fortify them
securely and to increase the garrison. It
is expected that a convention covering the
agreement will soon be signed.

BERLIN, Nov. 30.—The German govern-
ment has abandoned its intention of send-
ing the warship Gefion to Port au Prince,
Hayti, in order to enforce the demands of
Count Scherwilo, the German minister
there, who is insisting upon the payment
of an indemnity of Herr Imil Luenders for
alleged false imprisonment. The Gefion
instead will be sent to reinforce the Ger-
man fleet in Chinese waters. Baron
von Kulkow; the German minister for
foreign affairs, to day gave the United
States ambassador, Mr. Andrew D. White,
a wholly satisfactory explanation of Ger-
many's intentions towards Hayti.

HAVANA, Nov. 30.—It is officially an-
nounced that the insurgents dynamited a
freight train near Alquizar, province of
Pinar Del Rio, on Sunday last. The en-
gine was partly destroyed and the engi-
neer was injured. A Cuban Amazon, known
as Captain Regina Palenzuela, with five
insurgents fully armed, has surrendered to
the Spanish authorities at Neuva Paz, pro-
vince of Havana. The official reports have
it that only skirmishes have taken place
recently between Spanish troops and in-
surgents.
