Only 122 hours of sunshine were enjoyed by Prince Edward Islanders during the month of May according to data released by Mr. Warren Burns of the Dominion Weather Station at the Experimental Station during the same month of the past 46 years being 207 hours this represents a new low in sunshine. Temperatures during May were not too high either. The average daytime temperature was 56.3 and the average nighttime temperature 41.2 making an overall average of 48.7. The rainfall in this period was 3.07 and it was raining 15 days out of the 31.
