NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market moved into the plus column with a modest gain Wednesday for the first time this week.

Steel, motors, rubber, mail order-retails, farm implements, electronics, airlines and drugs paced the advance.

The Associated Press 60-stock average advanced 6 to 328.4 with industrials up 1.2, rails up 5 and utilities off 4.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials rose 2.58 to 881.7. It lost about a point in the final half hour of trading.

Snappy Rand., up 1/4 at 13-00 on 99,800 shares, was the most active stock.

Canadian Pacific held onto its early gain and finished with a 1/4-point rise to lead Canadian stocks. Distillers Seagrams was up 1/2.

Prices rose on the American exchange. Fargo Oil was up 5-16 and Scurry Rainbow Oil up 3/4.

MONTREAL (CP)—All sections advanced Wednesday on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges. Trading was moderate.

The composite index was up 0.2 to 121.3. Industrials were up 0.9 to 158.3.

Canada Cement rose 1 1/2 points to 52 and Asbestos 1/4 to 25 1/2.

Utilities were up 1.6 to 149.2. CPR added 1 1/2 points to 64 and Interprovincial Pipe Line 1/4 to 67 1/2.

Bell Telephone rose 1/4 to 27 1/2 and Brinco 1/4 to 6 1/2.

Banks were up 0.2 to 121.3. Montreal was up 1/2 to 62 and Provinciale 1/2 to 50 1/2.

Papers were up 1.6 to 125.0. Consolidated News point to 41 1/4.

Metals were mixed. In the base section Noranda fell 1/4 to 47 1/2 and Hudson Bay Mining 1/4 to 67 1/2.

Consolidated Mining and Smelting added 1/4 to 42 1/2. In the primaries, Dominion Bridge rose 1/4 to 27 1/2 and Dominion Foundries 1/4 to 26 1/2.

Steel of Canada added 1/4 to 27 1/2 and Algoma 1/4 to 27 1/2.

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Volvo Alone Making Cars This Week

TORONTO (CP)—Canadian car production will total 45 units this week compared with 2,117 last week, the Motor Vehicle Manufacturers' Association reports.

Reason for the drop is that all major producers have stopped their assembly lines and are changing over to 1966-model cars.

Volvo will turn out the 45 cars bringing this year's production to 2,065, up sharply from 1,459 turned out last year.

International Harvester has scheduled 260 trucks compared with 196 made last week.

JEFFERSON LAKE PETROCHEMICALS EARNINGS HIGHER

CALGARY (CP)—Jefferson Lake Petrochemicals of Canada Ltd. reports net earnings of \$796,835 or 38 cents a share in 1964.

The earnings were consolidated with those of Jefferson Minerals Corp., a subsidiary in the United States.

Jefferson Lake and its affiliate, Petrogas Processing Ltd., produced 392,130 long tons of sulphur in the 1965 period, reflecting an increase of 15 per cent in sales over 1964.

Gas sales were 5,565,306 cubic feet compared with 5,519,852 cubic feet of oil and condensate sales were 116,206 barrels compared with 110,109 barrels.

Expansion of the company's Calgary plant to produce butane and propane is on schedule and completion is expected in October.
