Swiss Youth Plans Kayak Voyage Across Canada

VANCOUVER (CP)—Jean Barholdi has always wanted to paddle across Canada in a kayak and this year he says he's going to do it. The 24-year-old Swiss youth, who came to Canada two years ago, has carefully selected his route, bought the kayak and made his plans. An expert at handling the cigar-shaped Eskimo craft, Jean says he intends to start on the 4,000-mile jaunt as soon as rivers in interior B. C. and the Prairies are clear of ice—probably in mid-April.

After several months during which time standing tall and sitting tall are practiced daily, the members of the class again classify their classmates according to the above categories and raise or lower their categories as the boys again walk "naturally" across the room.
