THE BLAST OF WAR.

Grim-visaged truly is war, glorious war, as it is so mis-named by the poet, that dread scourge which has entailed untold suffering upon the human race, which has depopulated kingdoms and empires, and has laid waste the fairest and most prosperous tracts of this beautiful earth, transforming a thriving and flourishing community from a state of prosperity and well-being into a deplorably pitiable condition of ruin and devastation, the homesteads pillaged and destroyed, the fertile land changed into a wilderness, and the inhabitants subjected to nameless horrors at the hands of an enraged and exasperated soldiery. And the change in the soldier himself when engaged in a sanguinary battle is equally startling. At times he may be a man of kindly or even gentle disposition, who would go out of his way to help a wayfarer who had met with a misfortune, or at inconvenience to himself would assist an unknown sufferer, yet in a hand-to-hand battle he is metamorphosed into a furious raging combatant, embued with the one frenzied desire to slaughter, his whole self on fire with mad, fierce rage against men whom he had never seen before, and who, personally, had never done him any harm, but whom he now strains every nerve and sinew and muscle to massacre, the greater the bloodshed, the greater being his ferocity and vehement impetuosity to kill, until, covered with gore, his own and his enemy's, he sinks down from the effects of wounds which in his excitement, in the stress of battle, he had scarce noticed.

But, however terrible war may be, yet while mankind is constituted as he still is, it is a necessary evil, and the brave soldier of sailor is a hero who deserves well of his country, for he is ready, if need be, to undergo privations, suffering, and even death in her defence, and for her sake, and without his aid and the fear inspired by his presence, the country would be mercilessly ravaged by her jealous foes, and ruthlessly despoiled of her wealth and prosperity. All honor then to those who are willing to enrol as her gallant defenders.

It is a strange paradox, that since the invention of modern weapons of destruction, the loss of life at battles is not nearly so great in proportion to the number of men engaged as formerly, when the combatants were armed with sword and spear. The greatest number killed recorded of any battle ever fought, occurred at the great battle of Zemaraim, when Abijah, King of Judæa, with an army of 400,000, slaughtered 200,000 of his enemy's host out of a total of 800,000 (II Chronicles xiii 17, Josephus Ant. Jews lib vii, cap. ii). This compares with the number killed and wounded at the battle of the Alma, which was 8,400 only, or about eight per cent, of the total number engaged on both sides. At the battle of Cressy, when the bow and arrow was the principal weapon, 31,200 men were placed hors de combat, or twenty-seven per cent. In the Crimean war it is stated that eighty-nine millions of shots were fired, 120,000 men being killed, being an average of 740 bullets fired for each man killed. In the Franco-German war, the Germans fired off 30,000,000 rifle cartridges and 363,000 rounds of artillery, killing or mortally wounding 77,000 French, equalling about 400 shots fired to each man killed.

But as the great principles of Christianity become more and more ingrained upon the nations, so war becomes less and less cruel. Now the Christian doctrine to love our enemies is adopted in a literal sense, and the enemy's wounded are tended and cared for, and their sufferings assuaged with as much assiduity as if they had not been enemies. The use of missiles which inflict needless pain, explosive bullets, and such like, is universally prohibited by an agreement amongst all Christian nations, whose beneficent example is also followed by nations, as Japan, who so far have not yet altogether adopted the Christian religion. The great aim now is to disable, not to kill outright, and, having wounded, to heal. But notwithstanding all this, war must ever be an exhibition of savagery and cruelty, and all nations worthy of the name of being great and brave are now mutually doing their utmost to avert such an awful calamity, and by acting together in reciprocal agreement, to check any outbreak of national passion which might plunge the civilized races of the world in a strife which, were it to break out, would probably far exceed in magnitude any war which has ever taken place on the earth.

But until that halcyon time arrives when swords shall be turned into ploughshares, and spears into pruning hooks, and nations shall not learn war any more, the gaunt form of the dread ghoulis spectre must ever be hovering over us, threatening to deluge us with blood, and to claim as its prey vast hecatombs of helpless victims. Let then the orisons of Christendom be raised with redoubled earnestness for the advent of the Prince of Peace, when concord and harmony shall reign unbroken from pole to pole, and discord and strife shall be banished from the face of the earth.
