Beautiful Wedding Held at Trinity United Church

An afternoon wedding at Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, Friday, 29 June, at 2.30 o'clock, Donald MacLeod, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Gordon of Victoria, Prince Edward Island, was united in marriage with Mr. Joseph Burda of York City. The Rev. A. F. Lean officiated.

The altar and choir loft were lit with massive arrangements of peonies, gladioli and carnations. The main body of the church reserved for guests, each pew marked with satin ribbon flowers.

A magnificent stained-glass window of Trinity church cast a glow on the young couple as they pledged their vows.

The lovely bride wore a period dress, especially designed for her by the Fifth Avenue, where she has been employed after her graduation with honors in Science at Dalhousie University. The dress was of French peau de soie Alencon lace bodice, leg of m sleeves, high neckline and long train. The fingertip illustration cascaded from an Elysian Eugenie headdress of tiny pearls. Woman Editor & Teacher From Japan Visits P. E. I.

Mrs. Tsuruchi Watari of Japan has been a most interesting visitor to our province. Mrs. Watari was born and educated in Japan. Her father established the Salvation Army in that land. Mrs. Watari in 1926 came to Princeton University to study. Upon her return to Japan she was married in 1933. Mrs. Watari was formerly Women's Editor of the Japanese Magazine Women's Friend and still contributes special articles. She is at present a teacher in Jiyu Gakuen School.

Mrs. Watari, a member of the United Church of Christ in Japan, is in Canada at the invitation of the United Church of Canada. She attended the Dominion board meeting of the Women's Missionary Society at Toronto, Japan, this coming year, is the subject for study of the W.M.S. and the young people of the United Church. Mrs. Watari left Japan by plane 18 May, 1937, and arrived the same day in Vancouver. She has been telling groups across Canada about Japan. Upon return to her country she will be able to give first hand impressions of Canada.

Miss Louise Calbeck, a former missionary in Japan, and her sister met Mrs. Watari at the boat. After dining with them at their home Mrs. Watari was brought to Charlottetown by Mrs. Cutcliffe and Mrs. Baznall.

Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Parker, both of whom have lived in Japan, had Mrs. Watari as their guest at their home during her visit in Charlottetown. They kindly invited friends to meet Mrs. Watari.

Much of the discussion of course was pertaining to Japan. Mrs. Carter, wife of Captain Carter of the Salvation Army, related the kindness of the Japanese guard to her brother, who was a Japanese war prisoner. At the end of his imprisonment he was taken to the guard's home where he met the charming little Japanese wife and had a meal with them. The Rev. A. F. MacLean and Mrs. MacLean were among the friends who met Mrs. Watari.

Jiyu Gakuen is the name of the private school in which Mrs. Watari teaches. The school is noted for its fine architecture. Most impressive is the introduction to the school in the school syllabus. This states: "Jiyu Gakuen (founded in 1921) is a school, a society, which lives grows and acts. Jiyu Gakuen will accept with pleasure, naive and serious minded boys and girls who are willing to educate themselves."

Very inspirational is the conclusion of the introduction which is as follows: "There is no instructor in our Jiyu Gakuen. Both pupil and teacher are to respect

each other and must learn alike the merits of each other. There is, however, only one established teacher for us; and he is Jesus Christ, through most of us may not realize it. In fact, in our school, we respect the freedom of thought and faith and we esteem personal liberty. For our own true wisdom, power, and faith originate only from study and research based upon this liberty. Our conduct, however, must have a certain basis, and this basis in our school is to follow Christ. In following him, let us think, study, and experience fully."

Mr. and Mrs. Y. Hani were the two founders and presidents of the school. They lived to exemplify Thinking, Living and Praying.

KEEP IN TRIM

Overweight Is Not Always Caused By Gland Trouble

Overweight is common and glandular deficiency is rare. Years back any excessive amount of overweight was blamed on faulty glands. Now it is known that only about three per cent of all overweight is influenced by glandular disfunction.

We do inherit our frame or body build, and we also inherit the tendency to accumulate fat in certain places. For example, often a mother and a daughter will both be inclined to have full hips. In some families the tendency is toward slender legs, and in others toward stocky legs. To a degree we do inherit the limbs of the family tree.

However, when the deposit of fat in certain places is carried to extremes, then the doctor looks into the possibility of a glandular disturbance.

TELL OF FUTILE EFFORTS

Recently a number of letters have come from readers complaining bitterly of futile efforts to reduce their oversize hips. Here

are excerpts from two letters: "I am almost at my wit's end. I am very narrow through the shoulders and bust, and while my upper arms are soft and flabby, my forearms are just skin and bones. My face and neck are so thin and scrawny I look about 15 pounds underweight in that part of my body. But my hips are 8 inches larger than my bust measurement, and flabby. I take size 12 up top, but my hips call for size 15. Please help me."

The second letter reads: "I am 32, mother of four children, 5' 11 1/2" and weigh 113 pounds. I have thin arms and legs and a very small bust. All my weight is in my hips and abdomen. I have used an exercise machine intensively for an hour or more a day for two years, without reducing my hips or abdomen one whit. What can I do?"

A MEDICAL PROBLEM

Their problem is a medical one and they need the help of an endocrinologist (gland specialist) or a gynecologist. It would be my suggestion that they ask their

Bear in mind that these cases of excess fatty deposits caused by glandular disfunction are the exception, not the rule. Also remember that endocrine glands do not determine the places where the fat due to overeating will be deposited. In overweight complicated by a glandular upset, diet

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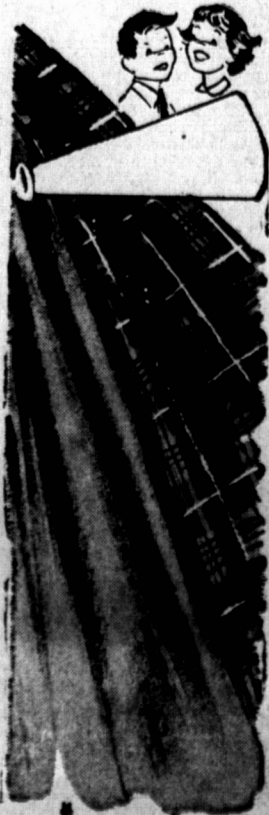
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1/2 c. soft shortening

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1/4 tsp. almond extract
2 teps. milk,
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1/2 c. chopped pecans or walnuts
Turn into greased loaf pan, (8 1/2" x 4 1/2" top inside measure), lined with greased waxed paper or fat. Bake in moderate oven, 350°, about 1 1/4 hours.
