### Silvela's Politic Act.

MADRID, April 6.—Premier Silvela has given great satisfaction by announcing that at the forthcoming Parliamentary elections the candidates nominated by the Chamber of Commerce throughout the kingdom will be accepted in every case as the official candidates, and will receive the support of the Government authorities. This is equivalent to a declaration that they will be elected, since in this country such a thing as the defeat at the polls of an official candidate is unknown.

## PERSONAL

Among the passengers to town by the eastern train this morning were Mr. Geo. Kemp, Mr. Jas McIsaac, city, and Mr. A. C. Cullen, Bay View.

The names of Stewart Simpson, of Bay View, and J. McNeill, of Kensington, did not appear in the paragraphs previously published regarding the Easter examinations in anatomy at McGill. Both passed.

A number of Prince of Wales College students returned to town by both eastern and westerns to-day, after spending the Easter holidays in their various homes. College opens on Monday.

The Gower Street Methodist Church, St. John's, Nfld., has extended a call to Rev. H. P. Cowperthwaite, who was at one time stationed in Charlottetown. Mr. Cowperthwaite has been pastor of the Methodist Church at Carb. near for several years.

Mr. W. D. Y. Earle, son of Mr. S. N. Earle, of Charlottetown, was a member of the Lachute hockey team which won from the Hawkesbury champions in a match played at Lachute a few days ago. Mr. Earle played in the forwards, and put up a grand game. The Watchman and Ottawa Valley Advocate, which came to hand to-day, has a full account of the match and a good likeness of the players.

It is pointed out by an exchange that Sir William C Macdonald's princely benefactions to McGill have not obliged him to draw very largely on his savings. He is still the largest holder of bank stocks in Canada, figuring in the returns just published for \$150,000 in the Canadian Bank of Commerce, \$150,000 in the Merchants Bank of Canada, and \$410,000 in the Bank of Montreal; a total of \$710,000, the market value of which is considerably over a million and a half. His income from this source alone is over fifty thousand dollars a year and as he is supposed to make something out of his tobacco factory and other investments his aggregate wealth is probably increasing notwithstanding his large gifts to education.

On Easter Saturday the Cardinal Archbishop of Rome raised to the priesthood, among many others from all parts of the civilized world, the Rev. J. T. Murphy, of the Diocese of Charlottetown. Father Murphy had been for a number of years in the Eternal City where, at the Propaganda and at the Canadian College, he has prosecuted his philosophical and theological studies. He has spent a year in an Austrian university, and his vacations in the various countries of Europe, making a special study of languages. Father Murphy will thus be a veritable polyglot, and as such specially qualified to render service to the teaching staff of St. Dunstan's College. He is a son of Thomas Murphy, Esq., Kinkora, and a brother of Dr. Murphy, Tignish.

**INTER-PROVINCIAL MATCHES.**—At the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Rifle Association decided to ask the Nova Scotia and P. E. Island associations to put off the inter-provincial matches, usually fixed on June 14th, to a later date and to adopt regulations suitable for the new rifle.

**LOBSTER FISHING.**—Unprecedented preparations are being made for lobster fishing west, a number of new establishments making a bid for this valuable crustacean, and the old houses offering bigger prices than ever before for green fish. Offers as high as \$2.50 per hundredweight for green fish are reported. Many old packers are contracting to sell green at fancy figures.

**BURNING FORESTS.**—A late despatch says: The forests for miles around Tampico, Texas, are burning like a furnace and as far as the eye can see there is a streak of fire and smoke apparently drawing near and nearer to the city. Fears are entertained that the fire will reach the Waters Pierce Oil Co's depot, endangering the lives of scores of people.

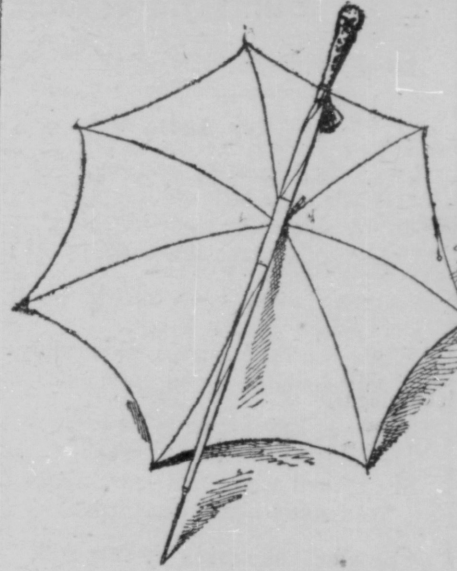
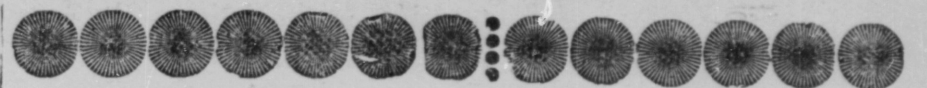
