P. E. I. Native Dies Suddenly in Mimico, Ont.

— On Saturday morning, June 11, death suddenly and unexpectedly claimed the life of Gordon Murray Linkletter at his home in Mimico, Ontario, at the age of twenty-five years. The deceased had been enjoying his usual good health and had just returned from his nightly duties as mechanic in the Canadian National Railway shop when he was seized with a heart attack, and although there was time to summon a doctor, medical aid was of no avail and he passed away within a few hours.

The late Gordon Linkletter, a son of Stanley and Myrtle Murray Linkletter, was born at Carleton Place where he received his early education, later moving with his parents to St. Eleanor's, and completed his education at the Summerside High School. In 1947 he went to Mimico, Ontario, where he entered the C. N. R. shop as a mechanic helper. He later married Eunice Walfield of Summerside, and to them was born a son, William (Bill), who is the only child.

Gordon was a boy and man of sterling qualities, and highest integrity, a person who made friends with all with whom he came in contact, ambitious and home loving, and in such short time had built himself up a home in Mimico, of which any young man might be proud.

His popularity with his fellow workmen and neighbors was clearly shown by the host of friends who paid tribute to his memory at the Hogle Funeral Parlors, Mimico, and by the profusion of flowers which accompanied his remains to the home of his parents, St. Eleanor's, from where the funeral was held on Thursday afternoon conducted by the Rev. C. D. Matheson of Trinity United Church, Summerside.

Friends from far and near assembled to pay their last tribute to the one so highly respected and loved, and the floral offerings were so greatly increased that the room and casket were banked in flowers.

The funeral procession, one of the largest seen in the community for some time, led to the People's Cemetery where the body was laid, it being borne to its last resting place by six of his friends and associates, Harry Cannon, Kline Court, Leigh Hogg, Roy Boates, Peter Pope and Layton Schurman.

To the sorrowing widow, son and parents, the deepest sympathy of the community and all friends is extended.

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Hard Loser

NEW YORK (AP)—Paula Aiello is a hard loser. She has struck a determined blow for that sadder of all breeds, the hopeless horse-racing sector.

On her first visit to a race track last Monday, the 28-year-old brunette dress buyer dropped a bundle—\$425 to be exact—on the ponies at Aqueduct. "This made Paula flip."

"I lost every wager," she mourned.

So Thursday, her lawyer filed a state Supreme Court suit against the track operators to recover the money. Said Lawyer Leo Bosco, Jr.:

"This suit affects everyone who bets or has bet on horses. If it is successful, everyone who lost money on a horse race can recover his losses."

The lawyer contends that since 1847 New York has had a law, section 994, that provides anyone who loses a bet "may sue and recover same."

In 1940, when the present pari-mutuel law was enacted, Bosco maintains, nothing was done about erasing section 994. So he argues that it still is in force and takes precedence over the 1940 statute.

Bosco said Miss Aiello went out to Aqueduct firmly determined to limit her bets to \$2 a race.

"But she caught the fever," he explained. Afterwards, in her remorse, she besought a few kind words from the lawyer.

Bosco said he has made a study of the laws relating to horse racing and he figured this was a good opportunity to test the pari-mutuel law.

TORONTO (CP)—A Toronto scoutmaster has received the Medal of Merit, a top scouting award, for 19 years of unselfish but un spectacular work. Jack Burch, 35, was given the award because "he represents the hundreds of consistent loyal good scout leaders."
