THE VICTORIAN AGE

The poets are: Tennyson, Arnold and Browning. Ruskin was an essayist. Let us study each one individually. Some headings for the study of Tennyson are: A lyrical gift, lack of intensity, orthodox religion, description of nature, ordinary subjects, surface melancholy, and imperialism. At best he is classical and disciplined. "The Lotus-Eaters" illustrates his skill of words. "Ulysses" defends imperialism. It is written in a perfect style of free-flowing blank verse. It is a poem built around simple concise words that suit his style. It contains no extraneous detail. His poem "The Revenge" also defends imperialism and lacks intensity. His poem "O Swallow, Swallow" illustrates his attempt to write musical poetry. It contains surface melancholy. "Tears, Idle Tears" illustrates his lyrical gift. "Come Down O Maid" illustrates his interest in nature. He was brought up in such surroundings. Arnold's poetry lacks the robust life of Browning's and the full-flavored lyricism of Tennyson's. Both Arnold and Hardy are downright pessimists. "Balders Pyre" illustrates his refined melancholy and ends with his outright pessimism. Browning's poetry moves rapidly. It tells a story or draws a character and passes on. The poem "Up At A Villa Down In The City" is different from other Victorian poems in that the person does not waste rustic nature. It is one of the first poems written in praise of the city. The style is conversational. "Pippa's Song" illustrates his belief in immortality which was typically Victorian. "Pheidippides" is written in his typical conversational style. He uses rough words while Tennyson has soft words. He is able to fit himself into any atmosphere. He paints life as he sees it. The third stanza of the Epilogue to Asolando illustrates his typically Victorian optimism. Ruskin's life was easy. He was well brought up and developed much taste in architecture. His cures for the social ills accompanying the Industrial Revolution was art production in all its forms. He defended "Turner's Slave Ship" and his work because he thought that Turner's work was connected with a spiritual interest and that it sprang from good society. He ties morals and arts together. The last paragraph of "Turner's Slave Ship" illustrates the above generalizations. The first paragraph is written in his clear rhythmetrical and musical style. "This," he said, "was the trouble; people praised his style rather than his concerns." (Continued.)

MOSAIC

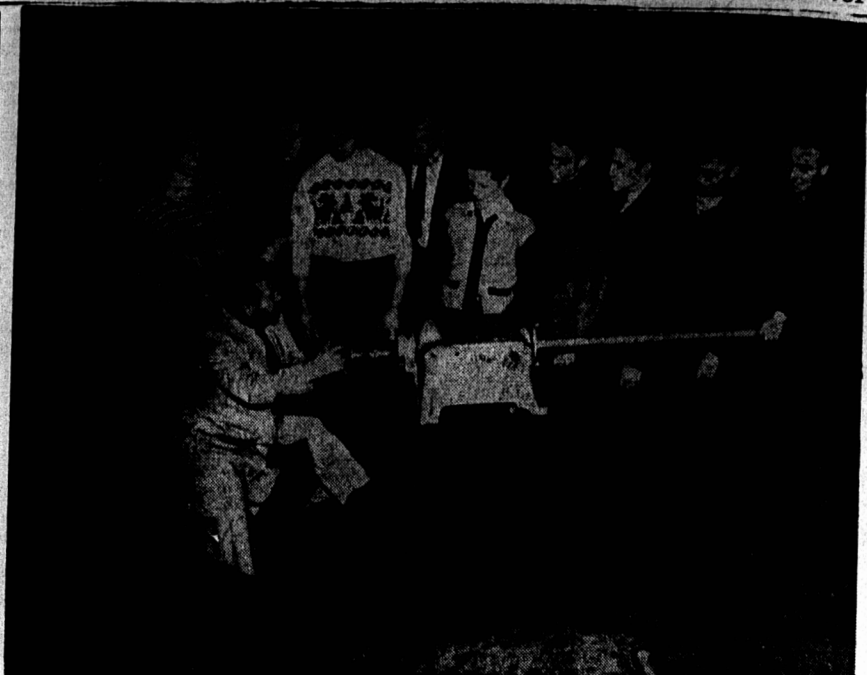
