Care of the Hair.

An expert declares through good house-keeping to those who want to keep a good head of hair that frequent brushing of the hair is recommended for its improvement.

The scalp should be made to grow with the vigorous use of a stiff-bristled brush, and a thorough brushing before going to bed at night is considered to be of the utmost importance. This gives gloss and softness, and long hair is in special need of it. Sage tea was an old-fashioned remedy for wetting the scalp and preventing the hair from falling out, and it is still regarded as excellent.

Ammonia and borax are both used as invigorators of the hair; but they should be used only in small quantities, or they will do more harm than good, for to much ammonia will inflame the scalp and too much borax will make the hair dry and brittle. Nor is soap good for the hair.

The scalp may be cleansed with the yolk of an egg, beaten in a very little water, and rubbed well into the scalp, where it should be allowed to dry and afterward rinsed off with lukewarm water containing a little ammonia. After the hair has been wet it should be thoroughly dried before going to bed and before going out into the open air. The scratching and irritating of the scalp with a sharp-toothed comb should be avoided, and the same danger is to be looked out for in the use of a metallic brush.

The giant of all guns is in process of construction. Krupp's works are making a 139-ton gun for the Italian ironclad Sardegna. It will be 52 feet long, with a bore 15.7 inches. It will fire a steel shell of 1,630 pounds with an initial velocity of 2,411 feet per second; or one of 2,314 pounds at 2,099 feet per second.

After attentive consideration of the subject Queen Victoria has decreed that no American woman shall be presented at the Court of St. James unaccompanied by their husbands. Her Majesty has come to the conclusion that though the American grass widow may be a most charming and respectable woman it is safer to keep her outside the Chinese wall of decorum which surrounds the British throne.

The deposits in the Moncton agency of the savings bank amounted to \$7,581 in May; the withdrawals for the month being \$10,304. The excess of withdrawals is due to investment in real estate, many of the depositors having recently purchased building lots or commenced the erection of houses. The total amount standing to the credit of the depositors in the Moncton agency, May 31st, was \$292,612.—Moncton Times.

An order has been issued from military headquarters at Ottawa to the effect that drill batteries to take part in the annual drill will march to camp in the distance not more than six miles, if more than six, but under 25 miles, an allowance in money at the rate of four cents per mile will issue for such of the men as cannot be carried on horses, gun carriages and limbers of battery. A system of rifle practice for non-commissioned officers and men of the permanent corps has been prepared.
