Why do we say it is time for a change? One of the chief reasons why we feel that a change is necessary is that our taxes are too high. Not only income tax, but Sales Taxes which hit the pocket book of everyone. Sales taxes have been increased by the present government and thus add very greatly to the increases in the cost of living. And as we all know, the cost of living is far higher than it should be in relation to our earning capacity. Hence we feel that in order to bring the cost of living down we must reduce these hidden taxes.

Taking Both Sides

The Liberals in their ad on one page say that it cannot be done, on the other page they say it has been done. They are trying to take both sides on this question. We say it can and will be done. We feel that a change is necessary also because conditions in the Maritime Provinces are not as good as in the rest of Canada, and we know that we are being discriminated against in this section of the country.

Previous to the last Federal election the Liberals passed the following resolution at their convention: They advocated "higher, but not higher rates, treaties to provide new markets for products of the farm, sea, mines and forests, cheap electrical power and the decentralization of industry."

A very fine policy! It would completely answer our problems in general, but, how much has been accomplished? We all know that the answer is practically nothing. Freight rates have been increased. Our markets have been severely reduced. Nothing has been done to provide changes. Electrical power and decentralization of industry has continued to central Canada faster than ever under the Liberals. The Maritime Provinces are indeed the forgotten section of Canada. Only a government with top heavy majority could afford to treat this section of the country with such contemptuous lack of consideration.

We know that the standard of living here is not nearly as high as in other sections of the country. In recent years the value of production in P.E.I. was 61 per cent below the national average. The average weekly wage was \$45.52, the lowest in Canada, and roughly \$15.00 less than that in Central Canada.

Trade in Canada has also deteriorated to a position of concern to everyone. We all realize that trade is a "two way street, and that we as a young, vigorous, producing nation must have outlets. During the first six months of last year we had a trading balance in our favor of \$14,000,000. During the first six months of this year we had a deficit balance of \$170,000,000. This illustrates clearly our sorry trade position today. We have lost most of our best British and European markets and are in danger of losing some of our American ones due to possible tariff restrictions. As our County of Kings is made up almost entirely of primary producers we stand to suffer in the weakness of Liberal Trade Policies.

and was withheld from the prisoner exchange for resisting Red propaganda. He knew of "10 or 12" others awaiting trial. Returning captives who have passed through Freedom Village's tin-roofed warehouse to be fed, clothed, examined and sent on their way to homes and hospitals, have related stories of Red brutality and neglect. Nearly all have told of being fed propaganda and of the Reds' violent reaction to men who resisted instruction.

Steady Hammering

Murray said the steady hammering of propaganda was compulsory and went on until "a lot of times a man had to worry about how to tell right from wrong because of the indoctrination they pounded into your head." Special efforts were made to turn soldiers of various nations and races against each other. U. S. Negro soldiers were fed a steady diet of lectures on "prejudice" at home.

There was evidence the Reds might be planning to hold back any prisoners they hold who served on the turbulent prison island of Koje.

Murray said there were "four guys in jail that were on Koje". The four Americans had served as guards on troublesome Koje when the Communist war prisoners were rioting. Many Red prisoners were killed.

I found out on going about the country that so many people are turning from the present Government. They feel that any Government too long in office loses its touch with the people and fails to respect the rights of the small man. There is only one alternative. That of voting for the Progressive Conservative candidates—to correct this situation.

We have received certain amounts in Public Works, these projects we feel are nothing more than what is our share and often far below what we should get.
