## Maple Leafs, Canadiens Win Games On Saturday

TORONTO, (CP) — Defenceman Jim Morrison clicked on a long shot late in the third period Saturday to give Toronto Maple Leafs a 1-0 victory over New York Rangers before 13,928 National Hockey League fans.

The shutout was goalie Harry Lumley's second in four games. Morrison picked an opportune time for his first goal of the year. Only recently given a regular position after a long stretch on the bench, he snared centre Tod Sloan's pass about 30 feet from the Ranger net and drilled a knee-high sizzler past Johnny Bower. That was at 15:29. Leafs picked up a penalty soon afterwards and Rangers closed off the game by swarming around Lumley for a tying goal. Bower was lifted for an extra attacker but Lumley was unbeatable.

Both clubs sent out makeshift combinations because of injuries. Rangers were without forwards Max Bentley and Carlisle Henry and defenceman Bob Chrystal.

Toronto had three forwards on the sick list: George Armstrong, Gordie Hannigan and Bob Baley. Referee Red Storey handed out seven minor penalties, four to Rangers.

### Montreal Team Wins Intermediate Football Title

MONTREAL, (CP) — Lakeshore Flyers overwhelmed Fort William Redskins 23-8 Saturday to win the Canadian intermediate football championship for the first time in 25 years.

The Flyers, behind a strong wing-line, walked all over the western team and halted the visitors' vaunted passing attack until the third quarter.

Charlie Baillie, Wilf O'Hagan, Joe Stracina and Kevin O'Neill counted for the Flyers with Ed Harris and Harold Snowball Harris getting the Fort William points.

"We have no alibi," said Fort William coach Jack Baldy James after the game. "We played our best and they played better."

He said the fact the Redskins played only one game in the past five weeks might have contributed to the defeat.

### Opposes Change In British Conscriptio.

LONDON, (AP) — Prime Minister Churchill said Monday any change in Britain's two-year conscription system would alarm her allies and imply to the Communist world that "NATO forces are breaking up."

He asked the House of Commons to reject a Labor motion calling for an annual parliamentary review of the call-up period.

Churchill said it would be unfortunate to tinker with the present system in view of the conference he will have at Bermuda early next month with Premier Joseph Laniel.

In a reference to the United States, the 78-year-old prime minister said the greatest of Britain's allies might be "quite needlessly disquieted" if Britain changed her conscription system.

He contended any change would lead Britain's allies to think it "the beginning of a policy, not of peace through strength, but of conciliation by weakness, which we regard as most dangerous to peace."

Labor leader Clement Attlee said the Opposition did not question the need for national service now but wanted the subject brought under review every year. He said: "We have to consider a balance between defence and economic stability and weigh how far we can afford this two-year service."

The Commons rejected by 304 votes to 261 the Labor proposal.

### Toronto Lawyer Argues Jury Trials Unconstitutional

BARRIE, Ont., (CP) — Perry Ryan, a Toronto lawyer, argued in court Tuesday that jury trials in Ontario are unconstitutional.

Appearing as counsel for a man accused of rape, Mr. Ryan contended that the BNA Act does not give provinces authority to set out procedure for selection of juries.

He maintained this was a procedural matter which comes under jurisdiction of the federal government.

Mr. Justice Dalton Wells, presiding at the Ontario Supreme had never before heard the point raised. He said he would make a note of Mr. Ryan's objection.

Mr. Ryan said that if his argument were accepted by the courts it would render all jury trials in Ontario since Confederation null and void.

Procedure for selecting juries for Ontario court cases is set out by provincial statutes.

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., (AP) — The American Locomotive Co. said Saturday reports of mechanical failures in its M-47 Patton tanks in Europe had resulted in a voluntary shutdown of two of the firm's upstate New York plants.

An Alco spokesman said it was expected that the problem would be solved at a meeting in Detroit on Monday.
