## PERILS OF THE SEA.

Ashore at Tryon—Narrow Escape at Cape Traverse.

The schooner Corsair, of the Gloucester fishing fleet, was stranded on the beach at Tryon a few days ago and at latest accounts was filled with water. The Corsair was en route to the Magdalen Islands from the Western bank, after having called at Souris. When the disaster occurred there was a stiff wind blowing and the weather was thick. Several schooners coming after the Corsair saw her position and in trying to avoid a similar disaster some of them collided and one snapped her boom. The crew abandoned the Corsair on Saturday and came to the city yesterday. The United States Consul will send them to Boston to-morrow. An effort will be made to float the Corsair and take her to Pictou for repairs. The Corsair is described as being worth about \$15,000 and as fine a vessel as in the fleet.

At Cape Traverse, on Saturday, three men narrowly escaped a watery grave. They were Daniel McKinnon, John Murray and Robert McLeod, and while they were setting herring nets their sloop was capsized by a strong wind. All three were thrown into the water, and were it not for the timely arrival of Captain Thomas Howatt would have met a watery grave. The men were very much exhausted when Captain Howatt reached them.

## A Revolt.

SOPIA, May 5.—A thousand or more peasants belonging to the neighborhood of the fortified town of Rutchuk, on the Danube, have mutinied. The sub-perfect and the gendarmes who sought to disperse the mutineers were disarmed and wounded, and the utmost efforts of the police to re-establish order were unavailing. Two companies of infantry accordingly were sent to the scene, and these troops the peasants now actually have surrounded. Reinforcements have been ordered to Rutchuk.

## An Emperor Honoured.

BERLIN, May 5.—Emperor Francis Joseph, of Austria, who left Vienna yesterday evening for Berlin in order to be present at the ceremonies and celebrations in connection with the coming of age of the German crown Prince (Frederick William) has appointed Emperor William, field-marshal-general of the Austrian army.

## Royal Donations

LONDON, May 5.—Queen Victoria has contributed 500 guineas and the Prince of Wales 250 guineas to the Mansion House, Ottawa fire relief fund. A Relief fund was opened at Glasgow to-day and about £2,000 was subscribed in a few hours.

BAD BURNING.—The four-year old daughter of Mr. Alex. Macdonald, of Summerside met with a serious accident on Saturday afternoon. She was playing near a burning pile of refuse and somehow her clothing caught fire. The burns were very severe, but the little girl is expected to recover.
