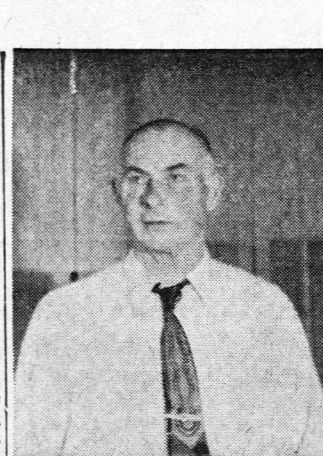
## Tyne Valley To Be Site Of Imperial Oil Co. Well No. 2

The farm of Bayfield Ramsay near Port Hill Station in the Tyne Valley district will be the site of the second exploratory oil well to be drilled on P. E. I. by the Imperial Oil Co. Ltd.

The depth of the first well drilled at St. Raphael near Wellington is nearing the 10,000 foot mark, the depth to which the oil Company originally intended to dig.

The new well at Tyne Valley is located beside a gravelled road about one mile from the pavement, and the drill rig will be erected on firm ground, a sharp contrast from the first site at Wellington.

While no announcement has been made as to when the change of drilling locations will be made, it is thought that the shift will take place within a week following cessation of operations at the site of the first well.
