## PATRIOTIC LECTURE

AT DUNDAS.

On Wednesday evening last Mr. Ward, an ex military man, delivered a lecture upon the 'British-Boer War,' at Dundas. The lecture which was illustrated by some good views, including leading battles, was excellently delivered, much information being derived, due to the fact of the lecturer's sojourn of three years in Natal. The views, which were shown to advantage by powerful illuminant, were magnificent. So well pleased indeed was the audience that Mr. Ward was prevailed upon to re-deliver the lecture in same hall on Thursday evening next. Mr Ward, who spent 12 years in the army, and saw active service in the Sudan against Arab Pasas, under Sir Garnet Wolseley, is a fluent speaker, and handles his subject in a manner most pleasing, fully describing the movement of troops as only those strongly conversant with military life can. It being Mr. Ward's intention to touch all principal villages on P. E. I., we commend him to our fellow loyalists, assuring them that the lecture and exhibit is worth much more than the trifling sum charged.

## Plague of Dead Fish.

DETROIT, Mich., July 27.—Lake St. Clair and the Detroit river have for the past week been filled with thousands of dead fish. Almost all of them are half grown herring though there are some perch and black bass among them. In some places down the river where the stream sets in with a back current, the whole surface of the water is white with them. On the upper end of Grosse Isle, where the current sets in strongly upon the beach, the dead fish are piled on the beach and extend in a white surface far out in the river. The United States fish commission can give no plausible reason for the sudden increase of herring death rate. At this season of the year there are always a great many dead fish in the river, but this sudden plague of herrings has found no satisfactory cause among the authorities.

## Indian Troops.

SIMLA, July 26.—The imperial government has sanctioned the raising of three new regiments of native infantry to garrison colonial stations, such as Mauritius and Singapore.

## Professor Robertson Coming.

OTTAWA, July 27.—Professor Robertson goes to the maritime provinces next week to superintend the establishment of chicken fattening stations in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. He will visit Truro and assist in the inauguration of manual training classes in the public and normal schools.

A HEROIC ACT.—The heroism of John McKinnon saved George Campbell from a terrible death at Grand Bay. N.B. Campbell is a sixteen-year-old boy employed in feeding waste wood into the furnace of Gregory's mill. In some way he fell backwards through the furnace door into the blazing wood. McKinnon saw the boy fall and ran to the top of the furnace to a manhole. Mill hands held him by the feet and lowered him head foremost into the furnace. He seized Campbell who was lying helpless upon a pile of smouldering wet wood and lifted him out. Both were badly burnt but neither will die.

STORE BURGLARISED.—The store of Mr. W. A. Hutcheon, on Grafton street, was entered last night and some money taken from the till and a quantity of goods appropriated. Mr. Hutcheon does not know what has been stolen, but as a wheelbarrow is missing the presumption is that at least a wheelbarrow full was taken. An entrance was effected through a window in the rear of the store. Several times previously the store was entered, Sunday fortnight being the last time that Mr. Hutcheon knows of. The matter is in the hands of the police, and it is hoped the guilty ones will be found out and punished.
