(Continued from page 6) Prince Edward Island United Fund is a voluntary organization seeking to combine all worthy health and welfare campaigns into one United campaign. This objective is first and foremost in the aims of the United Fund.

The basic organization consists of those who wish to contribute to the agencies represented by the fund. It is the policy of the fund to include all those agencies who make application to participate and who can meet the criteria as set out in our agency agreement.

In 1962, eighteen agencies made application to participate. Seventeen were accepted and the eighteenth is to be reviewed again this year. (Time was against their complying with all our requests and we mutually agreed to a one year delay in their application.)

The Retarded Children's Association did not make application to participate and were, therefore, not included. Several other agencies did not make application. They, along with the Retarded Children's Association were personally approached by members of our Board with a view to having applications submitted. We were unable to convince the local representatives, or, in some instances, the national offices, of the advantages of

working the United Way. Being a voluntary organization, we do not have any power to force these agencies to participate in the United Fund, nor would we want it that way. Every organization has the democratic right to place its cause before the public for support. The general public are the ones to decide how they will support each campaign.

The Prince Edward Island United Fund has at all times an open door policy toward these independent campaigns, and this includes all campaigns that are intended to raise money for health and welfare purposes. (Consideration will be given to the hospital's case for financial support, if they wish to submit an application and discuss their needs.) We would welcome applications from them for inclusion in our next campaign but we cannot force them to submit their budgets to the scrutiny of our budget committee while they remain independent.

SET UP FUND

OTTAWA (CP)—A fund to assist victims of the Rescor Sidling shooting near Kapuskasing in northern Ontario has been established by the Canadian Labor Congress. President Claude Jodan said an appeal to all CLC affiliated organizations has been authorized by the CLC executive council.

LONDON (Reuters) — The United States is conducting a systematic recruiting drive for British scientists, sending talent scouts to "buy British brain." Science Minister Lord Hallsham said Wednesday.

He was commenting in the House of Lords on recent reports about the number of British scientists emigrating to the U.S.

The Royal Society, Britain's leading scientific body, said last week about 50 British doctors of philosophy go to the U.S. to stay each year.

If temporary emigrants were included, the number soared to at least 260—or 22 per cent of the annual British output.

Hallsham said he would give the facts "quite brutally," adding:

"We are in the presence of a recruiting drive, systematically and deliberately undertaken by American business, by Ameri-

can universities and, to a lesser extent, the American government, often initiated by talent scouts specially sent over here to buy British brains."

The Americans are compelled to "live parasitically on other people's brains," he said. This is an enormous compliment Britain would rather do without. Lord Shackleton, an opposition Labor party peer, said it was "absurd" to suggest that the drain of British scientists is due to failure of the American educational system.

Guatemala Urges Cleanup In Cuba

WASHINGTON (AP)—Guatemala has urged the American Republics to initiate cleaning European and Asian Communists out of the unfortunate island of Cuba—"by force if necessary."

Guatemala's fiery-tongued president, Gen. Manuel Ydigoras Fuentes, expressed his country's position in a formal message to the Organization of American States, the United States and all Latin American republics except Cuba are active members.

Ydigoras said the self-respect of the OAS states demands a solution to "the frightful case of Cuba," if need be "with bayonets fixed."

The Guatemalan president's message was transmitted to the OAS governing council by Guatemala's foreign minister, Jesus Urdia Murillo, in whose honor Tuesday's special session was held.

Ydigoras struck out at Britain, which he contends illegally holds possession of "a piece of Guatemalan territory," British Honduras.

Ydigoras also broadened his attack to include France and The Netherlands which have territories in this hemisphere.

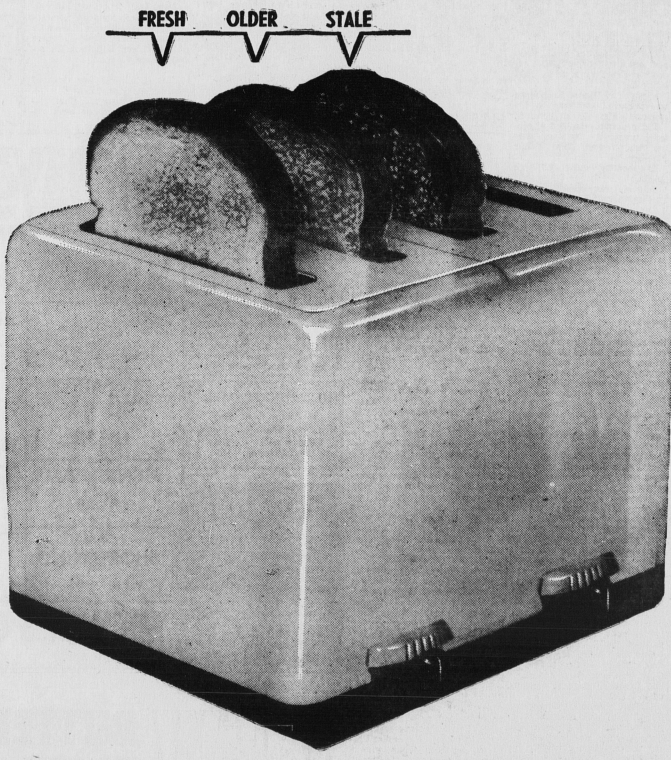
