Murray Harbor South Notes.

Signs of the coming spring are visible in this locality, as we see lobster traps and boats already on the move; of course they are only moving on the land as yet. The lobster business in this vicinity will not be carried on, on so large a scale as in former years, as the industry is not so profitable on account of the scarcity and small size of the fish. Greater preparations are being made for the prosecution of the cod and hake fishing.

Our creamery is doing a rushing business this winter under the management of Mr. Leith Cowan, whose butter cannot be surpassed by any one, as the demand for "the Murray Harbor South" dairy butter proves. The demand is greater than the supply. Our farmers are reaping a rich harvest from their dairy venture.

The measles and la grippe epidemics are about over. Murray Harbor has had a severe scourge from sickness and death this winter. We have lost some of our best citizens.

A social under the auspices of the Women's Missionary Society of this place was held at the home of Mrs. W. H. Prowse, on Friday, the 3rd inst. Quite a lengthy programme was rendered after which coffee and cake were served. At the close a collection was taken up amounting to \$8.00.

St. Patrick's night was celebrated in this place by a grand concert, given by the local talent of the place in aid of the P. E. Island Hospital. We are not saying too much when we pronounce it the best entertainment ever given in Murray Harbor. "The Dairy Maids Drill," by 16 young ladies was a grand feat and very pleasing to watch. A great many were kept away by the stormy night but roads. However the large hall was comfortably filled and the sum of \$22.00 realized. The best of order prevailed. Murray Harbor South, March 18, 1899.

At Ottawa a few days ago Sir Charles Tupper delivered an interesting address. He made a playful allusion to a reference made in the resolution to his "advancing years," and said that he was not conscious of any great advance, for he still felt young and hoped to be spared for some years yet to fight the battles of the Conservative party. Whether these years were few or many he would devote them entirely to the service of his country and to the great Conservative party under which Canada had grown and developed until it was the wonder and admiration of the world. He was not working for personal ambition, for there was no gift in the hands of the sovereign or the people which he had not enjoyed, but he was working, and would continue to work for the preservation of that confederation in the formation of which he had assisted and which was now threatened with destruction by men who had not contributed one brick to the noble structure (Applause) He declined to criticize the Government, as he would have an opportunity of doing so in the manner he liked best—in Parliament—face to face with his opponents, but he did want to congratulate the Liberal party, not on anything they had done, but on something they had not done. For eighteen years they had abusing the National Policy and saying that when they got into power every vestige of protection would be swept away. Well, they had got into power, and far from sweeping protection away, they had adopted the National policy holus bolus. (Laughter and applause.)

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Montreal Star: In the eight months of the current fiscal year, the Government has collected \$29,253,642 of revenue, of which \$22,620,000 was drawn from customs and excise duty—which is not a bad showing for a profitably free trade administration. It is an increase of \$4,000,000 from these sources over the same period of the preceding year. The net debt is \$3,000,000 larger than twelve months ago, and is steadily increasing at the rate of \$10,000 a day, which is another pretty fair showing for a Government that promised to gradually reduce the debt until it was almost wiped out altogether. For the ordinary services of the country, \$23,597,069 has been expended during the past eight months—another increase of \$2,000,000 over the same period in 1897-8—which is also a still more creditable record for the party whose watch word was "Economy and Retrenchment." Altogether the expenditure from last July to the end of February was about \$5,000,000 ahead of the corresponding previous period. This, too, is not so bad for a business government. We are beginning to see the point of Mr. Tarte's invitation to the people last autumn to "Wait till you see us next year." We are not waiting in vain.

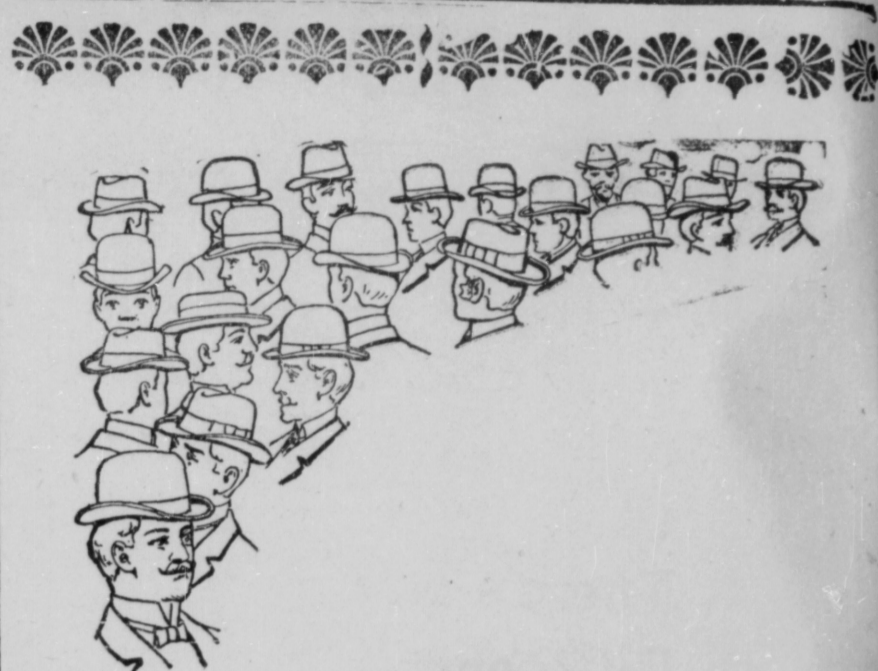

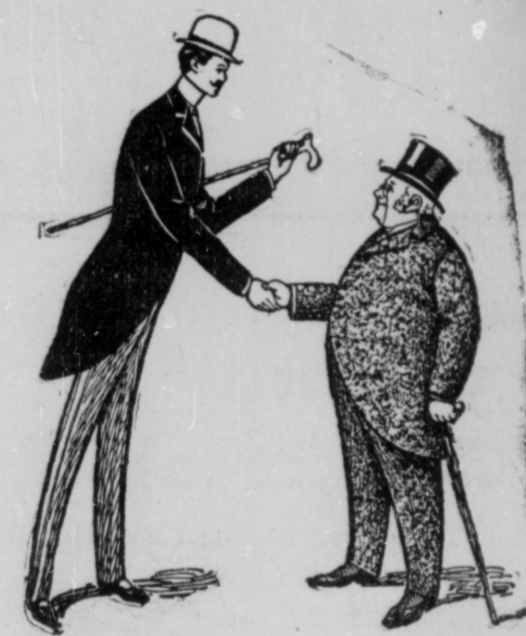
