ADDRESS TO JUDGE HENSLEY—NO CRIMINALS.

GRAND JURY ROOM, GEORGETOWN.

To the Honorable Justice Hensley: MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR.—Having nothing of a criminal nature to present to the Court, we join your Honor in congratulations upon the absence of crime in this County, which we believe is, in a measure, due to the earnestness with which the people of this County have endeavored to restrict the traffic and the evils resulting from intemperance.

GEORGETOWN COURT HOUSE, July 20th, 1880.

The Hon. Joseph Hensley, Assistant Judge of the Supreme Court:

MY LORD,—As you have now discharged the Grand Jury from further attendance at this term of the Supreme Court for this County, I have much pleasure in directing special attention to this occasion by presenting your Lordship with a pair of white gloves as a suitable emblem of the importance of the event; namely, the entire absence of any criminal cases for trial at this sitting of the Court.

The inhabitants of this County have great reason to congratulate themselves upon being in a position to present your Lordship with so pleasing a token of the moral condition of the County, in which your decisions have, at all times, met with universal approbation.

During the number of years which you have presided over this tribunal, they never had reason not to admire the unswerving justice which you meted out to all parties—a fact which they now regard as the principal cause of the shining record this Court is able to present to-day.

It gives us pleasure to insert the explanation of the Clerk of the Licensing Board, and we only regret that his statement of the case differs very widely from that of our reporter, who says that, not only was the information which we desired, refused, but it was refused in language of greater strength than courtesy. As similar information has hitherto been freely imparted to THE EXAMINER, and as we had before been courteously treated by the Clerk, we could draw no other inference than that the Clerk had, in this instance, received special instructions. It appears, however, that this was not the case; and we suppose that, in granting the applications of no less than thirty-seven liquor vendors, the Licensing Board think they have not done wrong. In view, however, of the fact that the citizens have declared, in the most emphatic way possible, that they desire no liquor selling in this town, it is highly probable that many persons entertain a different opinion. The Licensing Board had a grand opportunity to gain credit to themselves by giving effect to the will of the people. But instead of this, they have done what they could to defeat the law and perpetuate the traffic. We think they have made a mistake.

"The Secretary of the Licensing Board presents his compliments to the Editor of the EXAMINER, and begs to congratulate him on the ease and coolness which enables him to publish a most absurdly erroneous and unverified statement connected with the Licensing Board of the City. In the EXAMINER of the 20th inst., he charges the Secretary with having, at the instigation of the Board (or the licensees—he does not know which) endeavored to conceal the names of the licensed liquor vendors of the city, which said names, be it understood, are publicly printed and published in the annual financial statement and reports of the Corporation. If the duties of the reporter of the EXAMINER—who appears to be the originator of this matter—are of so arduous a nature that they will not allow him to copy a list of less than forty names for the information of the public, it is certainly not the fault of the Licensing Board, or its Secretary, who naturally referred him to the said published list and gave him the two names that were to be omitted, and whose application had been refused. The Licensing Board gave no orders of any kind about the matter—there being nothing to conceal, and the Secretary simply acted on a Resolution of the Licensing Board, passed in 1877, 'authorizing the Secretary to give to the Press in-

formation as to the action of the Board. Heretofore, not the slightest difficulty has occurred with any of the representatives of the Press, who have always treated the Licensing Board and its Secretary in the most obliging and gentlemanly manner. The Editor of the EXAMINER will oblige the Secretary of the Board by the insertion of this communication this day.

Provincial Exhibition, 1880.

TO BE HELD AT CHARLOTTETOWN ON THE 12th AND 13th OCTOBER NEXT.

A general meeting of the Board of Commissioners was held at the Grand Jury Room, Court House, on Tuesday, July 20th, as advertised. Present—Donald Ferguson, Wm. Campbell, R. P. Haythorne, G. W. G. W. DeBlois, Esq., was called to the Chair. Senator Haythorne, Chairman of the Committee appointed to prepare a Prize List, submitted a List as prepared by the Committee, which, after considerable discussion, was adopted.

The Board then proceeded to the appointment of Judges in the various classes according to the Prize List. Gentlemen from different parts of the three Counties were selected for this onerous and responsible work.

A committee was appointed to select competent judges in the event of any of those now appointed should decline to act, or be otherwise unavoidably absent.

The Judges appointed by the Board will be notified in due time by the Secretary of their appointment.

The Licensees.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—I wish to correct a very general misapprehension which exists with regard to the action of the Licensing Board in connection with the Temperance Act, the proclamation for which came too late for the Licensing Board to take action thereon; especially as I see in a weekly newspaper published every Tuesday in Charlottetown, the following most erroneous statement: "As the Licensing Board have not provided that licenses granted during the past year should all expire at a certain time, it is more than probable that the provisions of the Act in question cannot be applied to the city this year."

The writer of the above erroneous statement seems to take for granted that the Licensing Board have the power of making all licenses expire at a certain time. This has been done for them by the House of Assembly, who in 1879 passed an Act commonly known as Shaw's Act, making all licenses throughout the Province expire on the 2nd of August in each year, as respects all proceedings to be taken under the "Canada Temperance Act, 1878." And further the writer thereof, arguing from false premises of course, deduces an erroneous conclusion, viz: "That it is more than probable that the provisions of the Temperance Act in question cannot be applied to the city this year; thus trying to fasten blame on the Licensing Board, when the real facts of the case are these: The Canada Temperance Act provides that the proclamation bringing the Act into operation must be issued 90 days before the expiration of the licenses, that is before the 2nd day of August. This not having been done (why or wherefore those who voted for it know best) it of course follows that the Temperance Act is not in force in the city, and the local laws still govern the issuing of licenses, and the Licensing Board are empowered to grant licenses in the city for the year ending the 2nd day of August next.

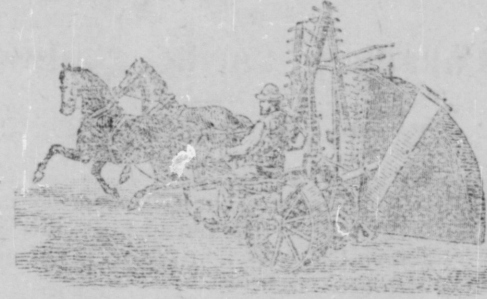
