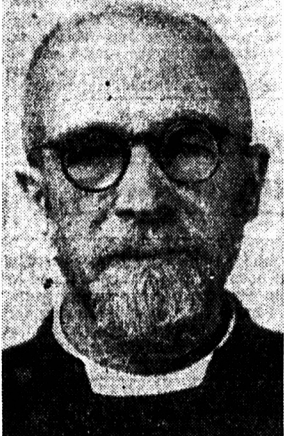

Reply To Senator McIntyre Re Sleeping Car Arrangements

In view of the difficulties involved in changing the schedule of the sleeping car service it has been recommended by the C.N.R. management that the 7 a.m. departure from Charlottetown should be maintained, according to word received recently by Senator J. McIntyre from Hon. Lionel Chevrier, Minister of Transport. The following letter in reply to representations made by Senator McIntyre is dated Ottawa, April 7: "Dear Senator McIntyre: "You will remember speaking and writing to me some weeks ago regarding the sleeping car service from Charlottetown to Montreal. "I have discussed this with the Management of the Canadian National Railways and now have their views. "They state that to carry out the suggestions you have made would involve changing the whole pattern of train service in the Maritimes. The report indicates that prior to the inauguration of the present sleeping car service between the points in question, considerable discussion in regard to connections, particularly the one from Charlottetown, took place and a thorough survey was conducted with respect to departure from Charlottetown of Train No. 39 at 6:30 a.m., instead of 7:00 a.m., in order to connect with the Ocean Limited at Moncton. "As a result of this survey, however, it was strongly recommended by our Operating and Traffic officers that the 7:00 a.m. departure from Charlottetown should be maintained. This decision was brought about by sounding out the feelings of the residents in the area who would most likely be interested in the service and the conclusion reached was that the present 7:00 a.m. departure is just about as early as average travellers will accept. As a matter of fact there are some who would find a later departure much more convenient. "The Management state that if they arranged for the Charlottetown sleeper to connect with the Ocean Limited it would, of course, mean an additional switching operation at Moncton which is the very thing they are trying to avoid in connection with this train in order that it may keep its faster schedule. The proposed change would also mean that coach passengers would have to leave Char-

lottetown half an hour sooner than at present and passengers going beyond Moncton would have to spend that extra half hour at Moncton which would mean a wait at Moncton of one hour and twenty minutes rather than fifty minutes as at present. "The Management agree that when the present arrangement was made, the Ottawa connection with Train 59 (The Scotian) would necessarily be close, but the decision was influenced to a great extent by the fact that the majority of passengers served by the through-sleeper car from Charlottetown are destined to Montreal and Toronto areas, and, of course, the Scotian makes the Toronto connection unless it is unusually late. A check of the records indicates that Ottawa connections were missed on six occasions in February and on only one occasion in March. "Although the Management cannot see their way clear to adopt your proposals, they have asked me to say how much your interest is appreciated and they would like you to know that every effort is being made to provide a satisfactory service. Black, and secretary treasurer, Mrs. Percy MacNevin. Both Dr. MacMillan and Mr. Black spoke briefly urging greater support for the Dispensary and outlining the need for its continuance despite the many other sources of aid available to people. Members of the executive for the coming year are Mrs. D. J. Riley, Mrs. Harry Tidmarsh, Mrs. W. J. P. MacMillan, Mrs. Blais Andrew, Mrs. Blythe Murray, Mrs. E. G. White, Mrs. Gordon MacDonald, Major T. E. MacNutt and Mr. Leo Doucette. The report of the Nurse showed that through the year approximately 70 index cards of cases were on file on the average. These were of old age pensioners, widows with children, families where the husband is ailing, unmarried mothers and elderly people in poor health. The vital need of medicine for these people was pointed out by Mrs. Goldie who stated that many of them even when they were working earned so little they had no surplus funds.

Brief In Support Of Stand Taken By Rustico Fishermen

Following is the text of a brief prepared in support of the resolution passed at the fishermen's meeting at North Rustico on Thursday, to which reference appeared in yesterday's Guardian: "We the fishermen of North Rustico and vicinity wish to make the following statement, in order to make clear our position in relation to the increase in carapace measure and the abnormal storm losses suffered by us last year. "We are in favor of any measure that will help conserve the lobsters, which is our main source of income. But we feel that there should have been no increase in carapace measure until more effective means were found to enforce the present law. We feel that such an increase is playing into the hands of the poachers, since more lobsters will be returned to the water by the law-abiding fishermen. We endorse the stand taken by the fishermen, who met in Summerside last Fall with the Federal Officers, that there should be no increase in size limit until the present law is enforced. Aside from the point of enforcement we feel that the increase was too large and, if necessary, should have been limited to 1/16 of an inch this year and another similar increase next year. Heavy Expenses "We are under very heavy expenses this year due to the disastrous storm losses of last spring and summer. Notwithstanding what has been reported recently in our press, these losses were of major proportions. In our area we lost 6,656 traps, and even allowing for a normal loss of 20% of 13,142 traps set, we still can count our loss at 2,723 traps. Setting the cost per trap at \$3.50 this makes our loss - above (Continued on Page 15)
