HUNGRY THIRTIES

Dr. MacDonald recalled that the Credit Union had its start in the Maritimes during the hungry thirties. He said that great economic changes had taken place since that time. "We are living now in the age of the super market on a large scale and the day of automation is here when a handful of men are doing the work of hundreds," he commented.

He emphasized the importance of organization, pointing out that no large business could expect to survive if sufficient time was not given to spreading the news of the organization. He noted that it was through the organization of trade unions that the majority of social benefits have been obtained. In this connection he listed such things as old age security, workmen's compensation, children's allowances and others.

A GREAT CHALLENGE

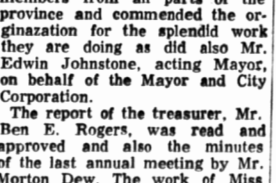

R. C. M. P. Find Truck Load Of Canned Milk; Six Are Charged

Ten charges of theft and possession of stolen goods were laid yesterday by the R.C.M.P. against six men who were arrested before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet at a special sitting of the Queen's County Magistrate's Court. The cases arose from an investigation by the R.C.M.P. into the theft of a large number of cases of Perfection canned milk, owned by the Central Creameries Co. Ltd.

The six men in question, were arrested on Wednesday evening and are all from Charlottetown and vicinity. Six of the ten charges were laid at the morning hearing during which Magistrate Gaudet, at the request of the Attorney General represented by J.P. Nicholson, adjourned the case until Wednesday, October 24. The accused were remanded to the Queen's County Jail with bail for each person set at either \$500, cash or a bond of \$2,000 each, consisting of two sureties of \$1,000 each.

Results of the investigation, which has been under way for the past week, led the R.C.M.P. to a barn in West Royalty where they apprehended one of the accused and a couple of juveniles loading 85 cases of the milk onto a truck, from the barn. The truck and its

load were taken into custody by the R.C.M.P. and after brief questioning the youths were released. Having obtained search warrants, the investigation then led to the east end of Dorchester Street in Charlottetown. Several buildings were gone through and a much smaller cache of canned milk was discovered and several more arrests were made.

Bail for five of the six men was received yesterday afternoon and the accused were released. Allison Gillis and R.R. Bell, Q.C., are appearing in defense of the accused.
