

London Times Approves Paying Canadian Loan

LONDON, (CP)—The London Times said editorially Monday that Britain has acted wisely in deciding to pay off the 1942 Canadian interest-free loan direct from its reserves of gold and dollars.

The reserves will be "much worse off," says the newspaper, but the country's private investors will benefit. Britain's net loss of dollars should be nil.

Britain announced last week that negotiations with Canada had resulted in revision of the method for repaying the balance of the \$100,000,000 loan. Plans are to wipe it out by 1958, following payment of \$39,000,000 this year and five later annual amounts of \$30,000,000.

And, as of Monday, United Kingdom holders of Canadian securities were free to switch the stocks to any quoted Canadian or U.S. security or from U.S. securities to quoted Canadian stocks.

Previously, Britain had been repaying the loan with the proceeds of any U.K.-owned Canadian securities sold in Canada. The treasury claimed the dollars, reimbursing the sellers in pounds.

The government used some of the dollars for Canadian investment and the rest for retiring the Canadian loan. But, says the newspaper, the system proved inadequate in the last year or two as Britain stepped up investment in Canada's expanding economy, thereby reducing loan repayment funds on hand.

Kluszewski May Win Batting And Home Run Titles In National League

NEW YORK, (AP)—Ted Kluszewski, Cincinnati first baseman, is making 1953 his best year in six major league campaigns, with a good chance of winning the National League's batting and home run titles.

Kluszewski collected 13 hits in 34 trips last week and picked up four points to move into third place with a .331 average. He also drove out two homers and now trails Eddie Mathews, the leader, by only one, 37-36.

Monte Irvin of New York Giants continues to head the National League hitters with a .338 mark. Carl Furillo, Brooklyn outfielder, moved into the runner-up slot at .335, with a 10-for-22 performance last week. Roy Campanella of Brooklyn Dodgers has driven in

most runs—111.

In the American League, Mickey Vernon maintains his No. 1 position with .331. But Minnie Minoso of Chicago White Sox has climbed to within two points of the Washington first sacker. Minoso gained seven points to 329, on 12 hits in 21 at bats. Records include Sunday's games.

Behind Vernon and Minoso in the American League come Al Rosen, Cleveland, .320. Rosen leads in runs batted in with 101 and is tied with Philadelphia's Gus Zernial for the most home runs, 29 each.

Southpaw Eddie Lopat is the American League's top pitcher with 12 victories and only two setbacks, with a 10-for-22 performance last week. Roy Campanella of Brooklyn Dodgers has driven in

Gardiner Pleased With Results Of U. S. Wheat Vote

REGINA, (CP)—Agriculture Minister Gardiner said Saturday he is pleased that American farmers have voted in favor of a reduced wheat acreage.

"The long-time problem in connection with wheat on this continent," Mr. Gardiner said, "has been the fact that the American acreage did increase at one stage up to \$3,000,000."

"Because of the considerable demand for wheat after the end of the war as a means of preventing starvation, the continuation of the high American acreage has been gradually building up a situation which in the end would create great difficulties."

"It is encouraging to note," he said, "that the American farmer has taken the view that his vote indicates, namely that the American acreage should be controlled."

Will Draft New Note To Russia

WASHINGTON (AP)—Britain, the United States and France this week will begin drafting a new note to Russia proposing that the Big Four agree promptly on arrangements, time and place for a meeting on Germany and Austria.

Diplomats of the three Western powers will meet at Paris early in the week to work out details of the note replying to a Soviet message on Aug. 5. Meanwhile the Western powers have reached a preliminary understanding to treat the Russian Aug. 5 message as an acceptance of their proposal July 15 for a Big Four meeting.

It would add to the possibility of settling many of the world's wheat problems on this continent if it could be possible for the Americans to adopt the position they took prior to the war, namely that Canadian wheat would be permitted to enter the United States for milling purposes.
